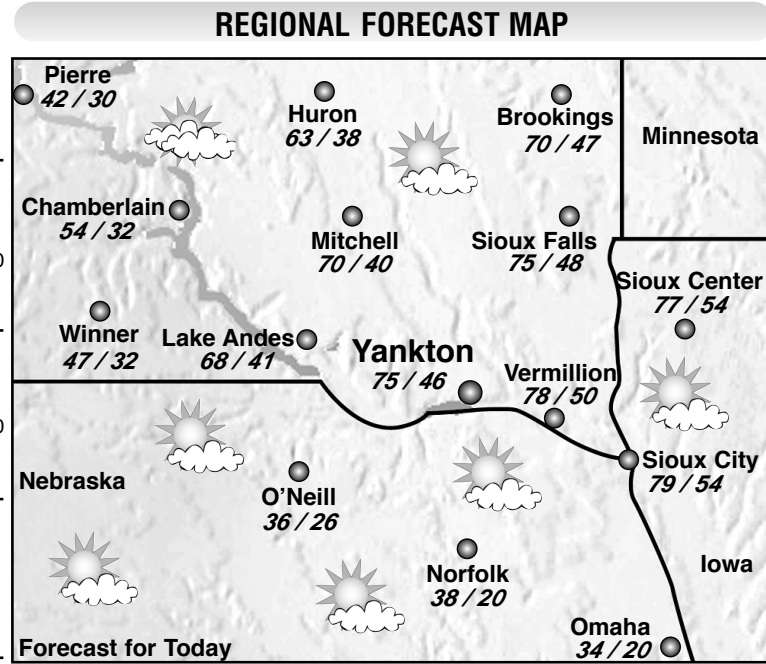

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE
Agriculture futures slid Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for May delivery sank 21.5 cents to \$4.505 a bushel, while May corn dropped 9.5 cents to \$3.45 a bushel and oats for May delivery fell 5.5 cents to \$2.08 a bushel. May soybeans plummeted 33 cents to \$9.41 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures advanced and pork futures traded lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle edged up 0.38 cent to 93.55 cents a pound; May feeder cattle rose 2 cents to \$1.1297 a pound; June lean hogs slipped 0.15 cent to 82.9 cents a pound; and May pork bellies lost 0.75 cent to 96.8 cents a pound.

Some cuts were made in out-of-state legislative travel and corporate tax incentives, Rep. Hunhoff said.

"But one of the cuts, that was humorous, was a \$970,000 cut in physics at (the University of South Dakota), and they don't have that particular program," he said. "They claimed a savings by not starting it. We're starting to sound a lot like Washington."

The Legislature did override vetoes on a need-based scholarship that will benefit the state, Rep. Hunhoff said. The Legislature also saved wind-energy incentives, he said.

"The governor said it was unfair to target an industry," he said. "But we have done it before for ethanol, railroads and even homesteading."

District 17 Sen. Ben Nesselhuf (D-Vermillion) said education became the target during the session.

"In addition to K-12 not getting their 1.2 percent statutory increase, they went after higher education," he said.

Students, their families and taxpayers will still foot the educa-

tion bill in other ways, Nesselhuf said.

"The universities still have to provide services and education. The tuition and fees just go up," he said. "The same with K-12. They still have to provide an education, so you can look for an increase in opt-outs."

Cutting \$40 million this year in the state budget will reduce pressure in the following fiscal year, said District 17 Rep. Jamie Boomgard (R-Chancellor).

"Hopefully, for fiscal year 2012, we will be looking at \$70 million (shortfall) rather than \$107 million," he said. "But that depends if we see increases (in unfunded federal mandates). This year, we had the \$52 million increase in Medicaid."

The relatively smaller percentage of discretionary spending in the budget makes cutting more difficult than citizens realize, Boomgard said.

"People say to make cuts in the \$1.159 billion that comes out of state funds," he said. "But \$770 million is off limits (for cuts), so you are looking at cutting \$36 million out of \$350 million, and that's difficult. Nobody takes any glee out of making cuts."

District 19 Rep. Bill Van Gerpen (R-Tyndall) said the

Legislature received a budgetary break through negotiations, Van Gerpen said.

"A big help to us this year was the fact that agreements were worked out with the utility and pipeline companies that invest in big projects in South Dakota," he said. "They receive tax refunds, and they will take cuts in the refund, which is projected to keep about \$14.5 million in the general fund."

Van Gerpen said he supported cuts to the Board of Regents, but not if the board passed along the cuts in the form of higher tuition and fees.

Van Gerpen said he opposed proposed deep cuts to the Dakota Digital Network (DDN), that schools use for distance learning. The loss of access to those academic programs could hurt students' ability to get needed classes for the Opportunity Scholarship, he said.

In the end, the proposed cuts were scaled back and spread out over broad technology programs, he said.

Van Gerpen supports keeping the inflationary increase of 1.2 percent for K-12, that would cost \$4 million.

"That is something more than just a budget item. It's an ethical and moral issue, because in the past (K-12) received 3 percent or the CPI (Consumer Price Index), whichever was less," he said.

"Here, we couldn't do it unless we were going to provide more for state employee pay raises and long-term care providers."

Providing additional funds for all three entities wasn't going to happen, Van Gerpen said.

"There was pretty heavy lobbying for every one of those particular agencies, and there was the attitude that we couldn't do (increases) for all three," he said.

District 17 Rep. Eldon Nygaard (D-Vermillion) said budget cuts in higher education will ultimately hurt South Dakota. The cuts will act like a tax increase for the students and families hit with higher tuition and fees, he said.

"We missed the opportunity, once again, at a time when other states are cutting funding to education," he said. "If we had increased funding and kept tuition and fees down, and provided more scholarships, we could have attracted students from all over the United States. Then we would be seen as the place to go for higher education."

That's especially true at a time when South Dakota State University in Brookings and the University of South Dakota in Vermillion have moved to NCAA Division I, Nygaard said.

"It's a time when our universities need to be growing rather than atrophying," he said.

K-12 education also suffered, not even receiving an inflationary increase, Nygaard said. And state employees didn't receive a raise for the third straight year, which could hurt the ability to attract and maintain a strong state workforce, he said.

Nygaard also pointed to quality-of-life issues, such as another round of cuts for the State Fair.

"We hear that other states are hurting worse than us," he said. "That may be true, but we are a pretty solid state financially, and we have a great opportunity."

Nygaard said he prefers cuts as the method for balancing the budget.

"This is one place where I happen to agree with Gov. Mike Rounds, who wanted money taken out of reserves," he said. "At a time when we could do things that would help us to get
