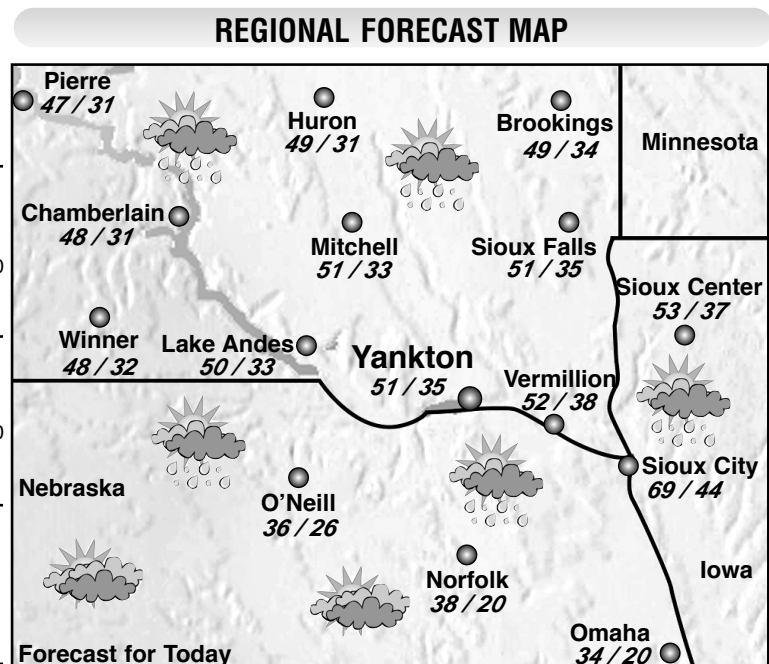

 Saturday, April 2, 1960
 A mammoth spring storm raged across the heart of the nation today, hurling snow and freezing rain on portions of the flood-besieged Midwest and torrential rains as far south as western Florida. Already 15,000 persons were homeless from the sudden spring thaw topped by fresh rains.

Student leaders at a Louisiana Negro college have pleaded with the 4,000 students there not to carry out a threatened mass walkout today in support of demands for freedom to

demonstrate for equal rights.

- Dag Hammarskold calls in South Africa's chief U.N. delegate today in his first direct move to persuade the nationalist government to scrap its harsh racial laws.

 To the disappointment of several veterans groups, including the Yankton Veteran's of Foreign Wars Post, the Sioux Falls City Commission voted Monday night to change the city's observance of Memorial Day from May 30 to the fourth Monday in May. The move means Sioux Falls will follow the federal observance of the holiday. State government still will observe the traditional May 30 date.

- A woman who runs a babysitting service in Vermillion has been charged with five counts of child abuse, the Clay state's attorney said today.
- The total spending tab in a 1986 GOP gubernatorial primary could hit \$1M, according to an estimate based on interviews with five Republicans who have said they're interested in running for governor.

To preserve the nautical feel of the restaurant, which was originally built to resemble a steamboat, porthole windows have been added to the building. Also, a buoy will greet patrons at the entrance.

New bathrooms have been constructed that meet ADA requirements, and the deck on the south side of the restaurant is being completely rebuilt.

It will be more oriented toward the marina and will be made of concrete and aggregate rock.

"There won't be any railings to look through," Van Meeteren said. "We're going to use landscaping around the edge of the patio to prevent people from falling off of it. We think it's really going to enhance the atmosphere of sitting out on the deck."

Van Meeteren said he has been asked why Game, Fish and Parks didn't just build a new restaurant instead of remodeling an almost 30-year-old structure. To build something of similar size would cost as much as \$1 million, he said.

"That's a lot of money, so we decided to use what we have," Van Meeteren said. "We re-covered it and insulated it better."

The remodeling project was designed by Mannes Architects of Yankton, and Wellf Construction of Yankton is the general contractor. Work began on the restaurant in early December and is expected to wrap up this month. Van Meeteren said the restaurant operator hopes to have the establishment open by the beginning of May.

"We're really excited about this," Van Meeteren said. "We decided the window of time was right to get it done. We've got a good operator that is running the restaurant right now. We want to work with those folks. Our goal is to increase the traffic and use out here. It would be great if, someday, it is a year-round restaurant."

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE
 Agriculture futures were mixed Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for May delivery climbed 4.25 cents to \$4.5475 a bushel, while May corn slipped 0.5 cent to \$3.445 a bushel and oats for May delivery added 2.5 cents to \$2.105 a bushel. May soybeans rose 1 cent to \$9.42 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures dropped and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle lost 0.03 cent to 93.52 cents a pound; May feeder cattle shed 0.27 cent to \$1.127 a pound; June lean hogs gained 0.47 cent to 83.37 cents a pound; and May pork bellies fell 0.1 cent to 96.7 cents a pound.
