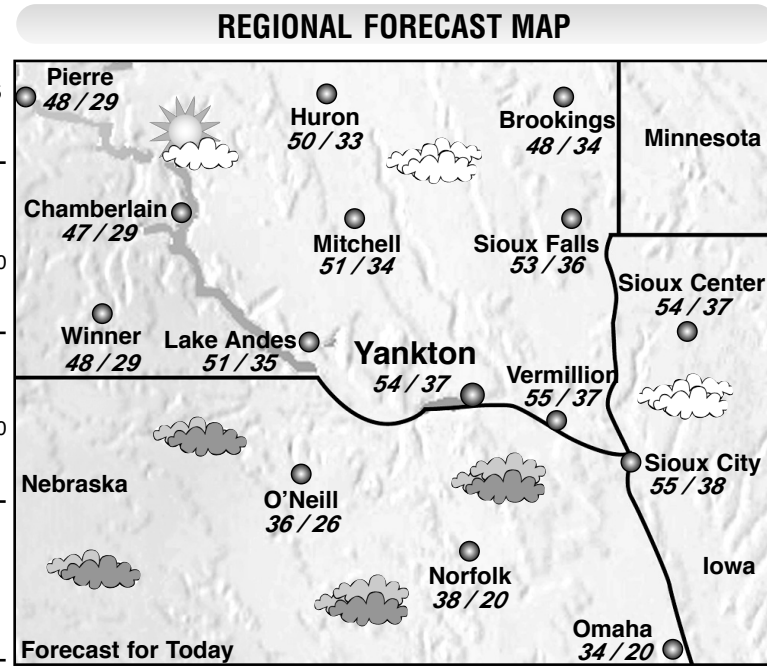

Saturday, April 6, 1935
The new deal today staked \$4,880,000,000 - the vastest peace-time appropriation in history - on its plan to swing from relief to public works while the nation watched to see who would be chosen to direct the task and just how the job would be tackled.
It was learned today, that one will propose at the coming Stresa conference an European mutual assistance pact spiked by a method of rapidly defining an aggressor to guarantee security in the face of German military moves.

Wednesday, April 6, 1960
Sen. John F. Kennedy hurred another high barrier in his drive for the Democratic presidential nomination today, winning the Wisconsin primary in a head-on collision with one of his principal rivals, Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota.
Government officials served notice today they will press their police drive against Negro "inciters and intimidators" until South Africa's work boycott is crushed.

25 YEARS AGO

Saturday, April 6, 1985
Former SDSU President Ray Hoops resigned at the request of the Board of Regents, but he will continue receiving his salary until Aug. 15, 1986, according to a copyright story in the Brookings Daily Register.

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

Agriculture futures were mixed Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for May delivery lost 1.25 cents to \$4.535 a bushel, while May corn added 1.25 cents to \$3.4575 a bushel and oats for May delivery fell 2.5 cents to \$2.08 a bushel. May soybeans dropped 6 cents to \$9.36

a bushel.
Meanwhile, beef and pork futures advanced on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
June live cattle rose 0.68 cent to 94.2 cents a pound; May feeder cattle gained 1.42 cents to \$1.1412 a pound; June lean hogs climbed 1.68 cents to 85.05 cents a pound; and May pork bellies edged up 1.82 cents to 98.52 cents a pound.
