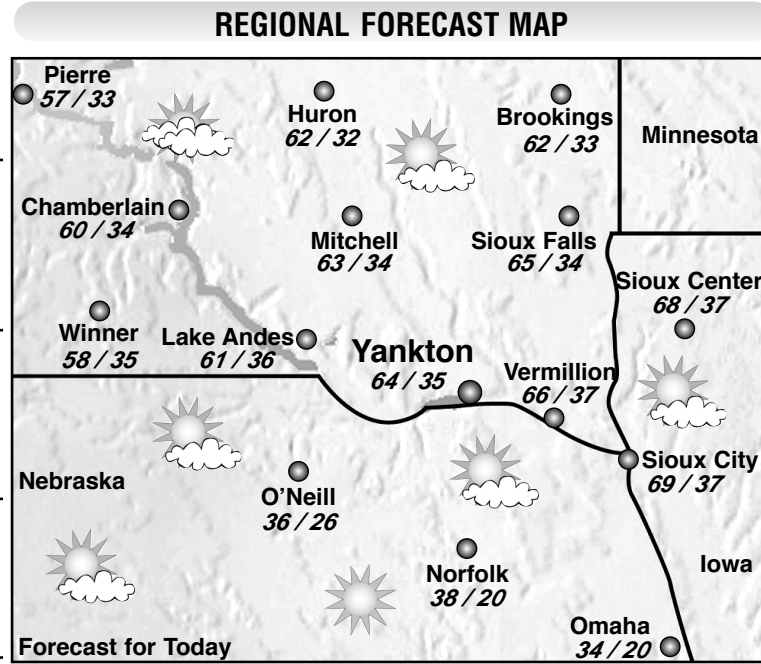

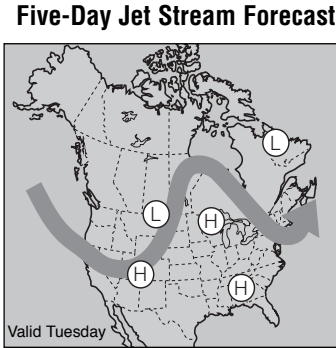

To do that, Specht contended that it is the job of school board members to make sure that they have provided all the tools and facilities the district needs, a position that he says past YSD boards have done a fantastic job doing.

"If we can continue to provide a safe, positive atmosphere in the schools, our students will be able to learn the essentials," Winter said. "They will learn to be decent citizens with manners who have tolerance and understand inclusion. If our students graduate learning how to think, we have succeeded."

One frustration that the candidates addressed was the lack of local control when it comes to mandated items, such as No Child Left Behind (NCLB) and funding.

"A lot of times, we here in South Dakota will hear complaints about the mandates," Specht said. "But those who complain will be the same ones who then roll up their sleeves and address the issues. We need to take the stance that the mandates provide us the opportunity to show how the Yankton School District had exceeded the standards."

The main issue discussed between Thursday was how the current federal mandates,

specifically the sub-group sizes associated with NCLB, are not fairly and equitably applied to all school districts.

Another federally funded program — class-size reduction teachers — and the possibility of having to absorb those costs locally was discussed.

"If the federal funding is no longer there, then we will have to find the funds locally to keep those teachers," Winter said. "The issue is becoming more intense because, as teachers take on additional classes — in the high school most are now teaching six sessions instead of five — the cost to the students must be debated. It is a dicey issue because it has been proven that more one-on-one time is better for students, but it also costs more."

Specht added that YSD currently receives between \$150,000-170,000 per year in the program.

"We don't find out about that funding until late June or July of the year," he said. "So what happens is, we are forced in March to notify those teachers that their contracts are not going to be renewed because we don't know if the funding will be there. If the federal money would no longer be available, the district budget as it stands today does not allow us the money to continue those positions. It would require us to look at an opt out."

Other issues mentioned by the candidates as being priorities included providing a safe learning environment, making a better effort to inform students of what opportunities are here in Yankton after graduation, and making sure that the curriculum is meeting the needs of the students.

"Education is, in reality, economic development for the community," Fitzgerald said. "The school has a role in making sure that it is possible to stay in the community after graduation. It is a challenge in any community."

All three candidates said that when new families look at moving to a community, the school is one of the first things young families will consider. In that role, they feel that YSD has been very successful.

"Yankton School District has been an economic beacon for the community," Winter said. "It is in the board's best interest to maintain that communication with the community."

The School Board election will be run in conjunction with the City Commission election Tuesday, April 13. Polls will be open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m.

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

Agriculture futures were mostly lower Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for May delivery dropped 6 cents to \$4.6925 a bushel, while May corn slid 8.25 cents to \$3.4825 a bushel and soybeans for May delivery fell 6 cents to \$9.465 a bushel. May oats were unchanged at \$2.175 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures fell and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle lost 0.43 cent to 94.32 cents a pound; May feeder cattle slipped 0.2 cent to \$1.1405 cents a pound; June lean hogs gained 0.12 cent to 84.72 cents a pound; and May pork bellies edged down 0.15 cent to 96.3 cents a pound.
