Hofstrand said combining ethanol revenue and costs from 2005-08, the fuel's total profits were "quite high."

But current revenue from ethanol production is only sufficient to cover the cost of producing ethanol and its feedstock corn, he added.

"If ethanol prices continue to decline, significant losses will occur," he said.

Shaw added that the U.S. industry also needs a positive response from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) on efforts to push through higher blends of gasoline above the current 10 percent for ordinary cars, with a 15 percent mix known as E15.

Ethanol makers claim E15 is safe for existing vehicles, but critics warn that higher blends could damage engines.

According to Shaw, the EPA is currently testing E15 and is expected to make an announcement by mid-2010, although Shaw doesn't believe a decision on the higher

blend will come out until the end of the year.

"The industry will continue to be challenged by efforts to regulate carbon and account for land use change," he added.

Currently, ethanol is blended in 80 percent of the nation's gasoline, but in order to meet rising demand created by the Renewable Fuels Standard, an additional 16 bio-refineries are being built or expanded that will add 1.4 billion gallons of new capacity.

In the recent report, "2010 Ethanol Industry Outlook," released by the Renewable Fuels Association, the ethanol industry more than paid for itself in 2009, substantiating on-going federal support.

The reports states that the combination of increased Gross Domestic Product (GDP) produced by the ethanol industry generated an estimated \$8.4 billion in tax revenue for the federal government, and nearly \$7.5 billion of additional tax revenue for state and local governments. The estimated cost of the two major federal incentives — VEETC and ethanol Small Producer Credit — totaled \$5 billion.

The report concluded that the ethanol industry generated a surplus of \$3.4 billion for the federal treasury.

"There were some pretty drastic reductions due to that fact," Kettering said.

The United Way held two new events during the past year in an attempt to supplement the funding it knew it might lose during its normal fundraising activities. A golf tournament was held in September and an archery shoot-off for local celebrities was held in February. Together, they raised approximately \$5,000.

"For the first year, we were very pleased," Kettering said.

A meeting was held Friday to begin planning for the 2011 campaign. Cappel said very little is set in stone right now. It is undecided if the organization will raise its fundraising goal beyond \$460,000.

"Most of it is really going to depend on what the agencies' needs are," he said. "We're just beginning to work with the agencies and their budget requests."

Even though the 2010 campaign has officially ended, Kettering said the United Way is still happy to accept donations.

"We will always take contributions, because there are always the needs of our neighbors," she said. "We'd still love to make that 2010 goal, if possible!"

Authorities have said that high levels of volatile methane gas may have played a role in the disaster. Massey has been repeatedly cited and fined for problems with the system that vents methane and for allowing combustible dust to build up.

At churches in the southern West Virginia coalfields, the focus was on reflection.

Judy Walker, whose longtime friend Workman died in the accident, stood before the altar at New Life Assembly in tears, mourning the heartache of families she helped cook for this week as they awaited word of their loved ones' fates.

"All we can do is love on them. When you see them out, hug on them," she said. "Just let them talk about their fathers, brothers and sons."

fund-raiser when you compare it to all the other fundraising done in the community, because we are not just there for one interest," Kettering said. "When people give to the United Way, they are reaching a lot of people with that gift."

Kettering said the shortfall should not endanger funding for agencies the United Way supports at this point.

"At 90 percent, we feel we can still fund the agencies," she said. "Because former years have been so successful, we do have a reserve we can use. That's what the reserve is for."

Part of the decline in fundraising was due to the fact that some companies were unable to donate as much as they had in past years, according to Kettering. In some cases where companies matched the donations of their employees, they could not do it at previous levels.

A complete list of victims has yet to be released. Two other miners were injured in the blast, and one remains hospitalized.

A team of federal investigators will arrive Monday as officials try to figure out what caused the blast. Virginia-based Massey has been under scrutiny for a string of safety violations at the mine, though CEO Don Blankenship has defended the company's record and disputed accusations that he puts profits ahead of safety.
