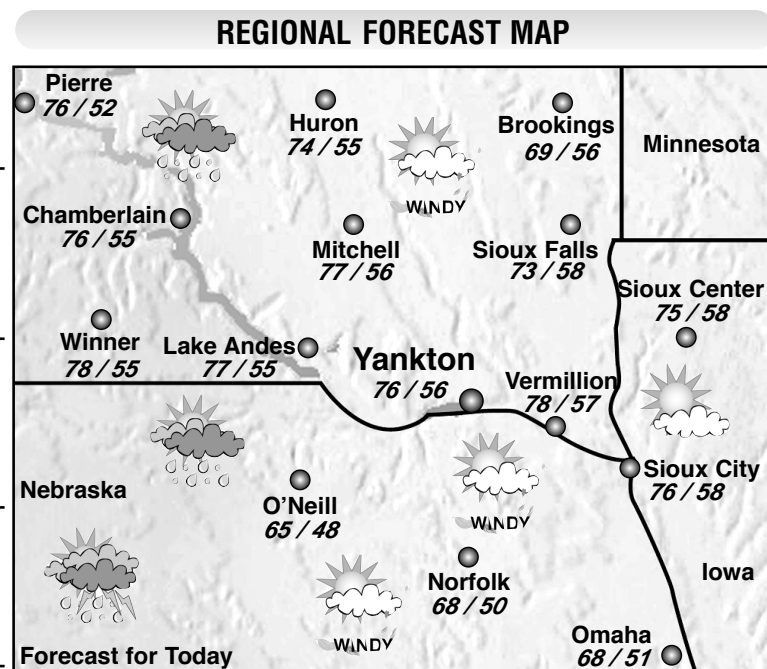

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE
 Agriculture futures climbed Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
 Wheat for July delivery added 1.25 cents to \$4.805 a bushel, while July corn gained 2.25 cents to \$3.595 a bushel and oats for May delivery rose 3 cents to \$2.18 a bushel. May soybeans jumped 7.75 cents to \$9.60 a bushel.
 Meanwhile, beef and pork futures traded lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
 June live cattle lost 0.7 cent to 94.05 cents a pound; May feeder cattle fell 0.32 cent to \$1.1505 a pound; June lean hogs shed 0.4 cent to 83.97 cents a pound; and May pork bellies slid 2.62 cents to 93.65 cents a pound.
