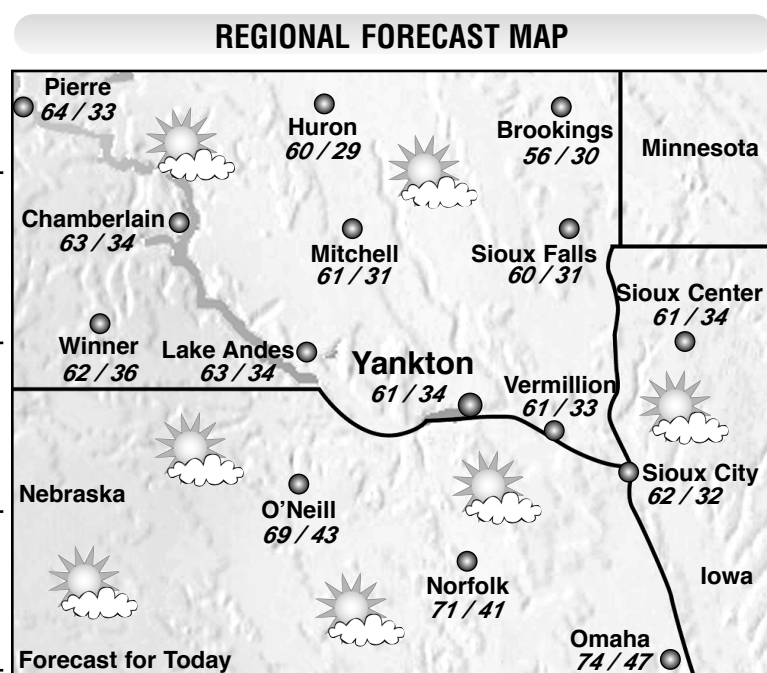

Yankton Named Tree City USA Community

Yankton has been recognized by the nonprofit Arbor Day Foundation as a Tree City USA community for its commitment to urban forestry.

It is the 27th year Yankton has earned this national designation. The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in cooperation with the National Association of State Foresters and the USDA Forest Service.

Yankton has met the four standards to become a Tree City USA community. Tree City USA communities must have a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, a comprehensive community forestry program, and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

Communities that earn Tree City USA recognition not only have taken the time to meet the four standards, they know that trees:

- Promote healthier communities by filtering the air we breathe by removing dust and other particles.
- Moderate climate, conserve water and provide vital habitat for wildlife.
- Reduce the heat island effect in urban areas caused by pavement and buildings.
- Increase property values and reduce energy use and add beauty to our homes and neighborhoods.

HSC Receives National Stimulus Funding

The South Dakota Human Services Center in Yankton was one of the projects announced Thursday to receive a portion of a \$25 million allocation from the Recovery Zone Bond, the office of Gov. Mike Rounds announced.

The HSC project is one of four shovel-ready construction projects funded.

As part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (stimulus), Congress authorized allocation of the bond authority to foster economic activity and construction.

South Dakota counties received \$90 million in allocation funds for projects geared toward public use and benefit in areas designated as Recovery Zones. A recovery zone is defined as an area that has sustained general economic distress as a result of the current recession.

Counties without need of the special bond authority reverted allocations of \$25 million to the state, the governor said.

The HSC proposal is a \$5,630,000 project to construct and equip a new dietary services building that will be attached to the George S. Mickelson Center for the Neurosciences. Authority for the project was approved by the 2010 Legislature. Yankton County waived its allocation of Recovery Zone Bonds to make the project possible.

This event is a fundraiser to support local Special Olympic athletes.

Registration and lunch for the general public and Plunge participants runs from 11 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. The costume parade starts at 1 p.m., and plunging begins at 2 p.m.

No park fee is required to attend this event.

YSD Applying For NCLB Funding

Yankton School District is in the process of applying for federal funding for the 2010-11 school year under the No Child Left Behind Act Of 2001.

Signed into law by President George W. Bush on Dec. 13, 2002, the statute contains several "titles," three of which are applicable to a district of Yankton's size:

- Title I, Part A — Reading Recovery
- Title II, Part A — Improving teacher quality to fund staff development activities
- Title II, Part D — State and local technology

A major focus in this legislation is parental, student, and community participation in the planning and designing of programs funded using federal education dollars.

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

Wheat for July delivery rose 5.5 cents to \$4.9275 a bushel, while July corn added 5.25 cents to \$3.7375 a bushel and oats for May delivery rose 1.75 cents to \$2.175 a bushel. May soybeans jumped 15 cents to \$9.64 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef and pork futures also traded higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle climbed 1.35 cents to 94.3 cents a pound; May feeder cattle edged up 0.6 cent to \$1.128 a pound; June lean hogs rose 1.12 cents to 86.07 cents a pound; and May pork bellies gained 1.5 cents to 95.55 cents a pound.

ON THIS DATE

75 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, April 16, 1935

- Voting activity was heavy today in Yankton, as the largest number of voters cast in the history of the city loomed as a good possibility. The ordinarily light morning vote was running well over 1,200 voters by noon as the positions of mayor, finance commissioner and two justices of the peace were up for grabs.
- Yankton is receiving its first shipments of legal liquor since prohibition took effect way back in 1917. Already orders have been filled at Menno, Wagner and other towns in the vicinity of Yankton.

50 YEARS AGO

Saturday, April 16, 1960

- Fidel Castro's agents rounded up hundreds of suspects in Cuba today in a determined bid to keep a pocket-sized revolt against his revolutionary regime from reaching dangerous proportions.
- Forty-three slot machines seized in South Dakota in January will soon become scrap iron. Federal authorities had arrested two Kansans at Scotland for bringing the one-arm bandits to South Dakota. The machines were stored but not used at Tyndall and Salem.

25 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, April 16, 1985

- A nationwide scam that has cost its victims more than \$2M since 1982 hit Yankton Thursday when almost \$2,300 in phony U.S. postal money orders were discovered by an alert bank teller.
- Friday night trade is up and growing since downtown businesses adopted a uniform Friday night opening policy, according to Kathleen Piper, Downtown Yankton Association president. Most businesses have extended their hours to 7:30 p.m. with some open until 9.
