to cost \$50,000, but that was two years ago — and now they understand it is probably going to cost more.

The group has raised \$30,000 in actual dollars and commitments so far. The members are hoping that their efforts will show the state they are serious about the project. They understand they have already moved up the list of when they will be eligible for funding from the Department of School and Public Lands, which owns the property. With more effort, Lafey said, the group is hoping to be number three or four on the list.

The group's second project will be to work on the sidewalks, remove some trees that are causing damage and generally clean up the area. That is followed by putting in a boat ramp that will handle small fishing boats. Totals for the complete renovation have been estimated by engineers at \$379,000, which is a tall order for a small town.

In the fall, the group again will sponsor spaghetti feed, and next year there will be a raffle in conjunction with the Tripp Sesquicentennial Celebration and Alumni Reunion.

can be an indicator for the economic health of the agriculture industry in the present, and forecast trends for the future.

"Agribusinesses can see how confident producers are with their own economic situation, and use that in their decision-making," Dwyer said. "We think the index will also reveal where ag might be overperforming or underperforming in relation to the overall trends of the general economy."

DTN/The Progressive Farmer will survey a sampling of 500 American farmers and ranchers three times each year.

"We will be conducting the survey at pre-planting, pre-harvest and at the end of the year,

The first sampling will take place in April. Drawing on the most recent data from the USDA Agriculture Census in 2007, the survey sample will be representative of the major types, sizes and locations of farms/ranches across the U.S.

"The information can first be obtained on our Web site (http://dtnprogressivefarmer.com) and then in the June/July issue of our magazine we will be doing a complete spread going further into what the Ag Index is and the results, and some producer snapshots. But the best and most timely place to access the results is online."

noted that higher education received more than 60 percent of the spending cuts approved by the Legislature.

"That ought to be the headline: Is this a fair deal?" Jewett said.

The cuts are likely to hurt student services and make it harder for students to get into some courses at a time the universities' enrollment is at a record high of nearly 33,800. They also will hinder the growth in university research that the Legislature has supported in the past decade, said Monte Kramer, the board's finance director.

Jewett said the Legislature has hurt universities by not providing extra money to cover inflation, utility costs and other expenses that have amounted to

\$50 million in the past 15 years. University faculty and other employees, like all state workers, will get no pay raise next year.

Regent James Hansen of Pierre said the Legislature needs to come up with more state money to support the universities.

Many South Dakota residents already cannot afford to attend the schools, and more students will go to colleges in other states if South Dakota's tuition continues to rise, he said.

A report by the board's staff indicates that an average resident student will pay total costs of \$11,888 for tuition, fees, housing and meals this year, which is the third lowest price tag among the surrounding six states.

When counting just tuition and fees, however, South Dakota has the second highest cost among those states.

South Dakota also ranks near the bottom of surrounding states in terms of state dollars provided to universities.
