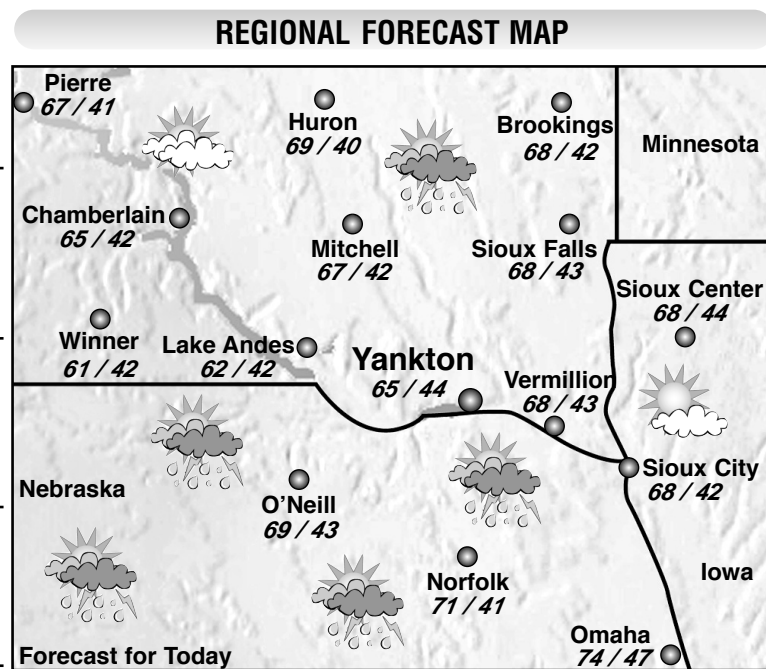

75 YEARS AGO
Saturday, April 20, 1935
 • A short, curt note to the powers of Europe flatly rejecting the League of Nations council's condemnation of German rearmament was Reichsleiter Hitler's birthday gift to himself and the world today.
 • More than 400 organized employees of the Omaha and Council Bluffs street railway company struck for higher pay, closed shop recognition and working hour concessions at 4 a.m., today, leaving the city's tram service paralyzed for the third time in a year by a walkout.

50 YEARS AGO
Wednesday, April 20, 1960
 • In a Yankton city election which failed to arouse much voter interest, Yankton residents Tuesday approved the creation of a plan commission by a slim 9-vote margin, 577-568, and overwhelming voted against the question of accepting as a gift the old Central school property, 802 to 365.
 • Amid religious ceremony and the throop of samba drums, the glittering, still-unfinished city of Brasilia deep in Brazil's heartland becomes the nation's new capital at the stroke of midnight.

25 YEARS AGO
Saturday, April 20, 1985
 • Yankton got its first tornado scare of the season Friday night, but the community managed to escape much of the destruction that the high winds visited upon towns and farms to the south and west of it. At least four tornadoes accompanied the storm band. One man was hospitalized in Tyndall with hip and shoulder injuries Friday evening.
 • A public hearing set to review the Yankton Board of Education's options for a new football/athletic track is set for tonight. Construction of the new facility at one of two locations, behind Yankton Senior High School or at Crane-Youngwood Field on the Yankton College campus is the main topic.

 Three children were treated for slight injuries after a fire was discovered inside a vehicle parked at Yankton's Lincoln Elementary School Monday afternoon.
 At about 3:30 p.m., a school official discovered a small fire in the vehicle, where the three children were located. The children were removed and a bus driver put out the flames with a fire extinguisher. The children were transported by ambulance to a local medical facility, where they were treated and released.
