Water Customers May Notice Pressure Change

Sandblasting, Re-Painting Of West Tower To Begin Today

Municipal water customers on the north and west sides of Yankton may notice a difference in water pressure beginning today (Thursday).

Maguire Iron of Sioux Falls began moving equipment in Wednesday to begin sandblasting and re-painting the interior of the water tower west of Mount Marty College. The process will take six to eight weeks, and residents can expect a difference in water pressure during that time.

Conversely, customers served by the Memorial Park water tower, which roughly covers the

area south of 21st Street and east of Locust Street, will notice a change when work begins on that structure in the summer or fall.

Water pressure in the region served by the west tower is normally 72 pounds per square inch. Kyle Goodmanson, the city's Environmental Services director, said it could drop between 10-15 pounds per square inch once the project is under way. However, a new booster station along Peninah Street will be kept running 24 hours a day in order to counteract the loss.

"We think it will be between 10-15 pounds per square inch, but we're not really sure what we'll see for a pressure drop because this is the first time we've had that booster station in service during a project like this."

The cost of re-painting the west tower is \$292,000, while re-painting the Memorial Park tower will cost \$282,000. The city will receive a 10 percent forgiveness on the project's principal cost courtesy of the national stimulus package.

Both towers are in need of the facilities, according to Goodmanson.

"These protective coatings are extremely important to prevent rust and prolong the lives of the towers," he said.

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

Agriculture futures advanced Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery rose 1.25 cents to \$4.9975 a bushel, while July corn added 3.75 cents to \$3.69 a bushel and oats for July delivery gained 4 cents to \$2.195 a bushel. July soybeans jumped 12 cents to \$10.06 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures traded higher and pork futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle edged up 0.85 cent to 95.45 cents a pound; May feeder cattle rose 0.4 cent to \$1.1295 a pound; June lean hogs climbed 1.57 cents to 87.07 cents a pound; and May pork bellies fell 1.13 cents to 96.72 cents a pound.

Gayville Man Arrested In Connection With Burglaries

A Gayville man has been arrested in connection with two burglaries that occurred last year.

Lucas Packard, 20, was arrested April 16 for two counts of third-degree burglary, according to the Yankton County Sheriff's Office. He is accused of stealing from Mac's Pub in Volin on Sept. 2, 2009, and from Wild Bill Cody's Bar in Gayville on Oct. 11, 2009.

During the Mac's Pub burglary, \$320 was stolen. The second incident involved the theft of eight bottles of liquor, three cartons of cigarettes and a money

bag containing lottery tickets.

The public led investigators to the arrest, Sheriff Dave Hunhoff said.

"We got a tip from the public that helped enormously," he stated. "It was a Crimestoppers tip that we paid a reward on."

Since the burglaries in Gayville and Volin, Packard and another male got caught committing a burglary in Beresford, according to Hunhoff. As a result, Packard spent some time in the Minnehaha County Jail and was eventually arrested by Yankton County after being released from that institution.

Hunhoff said the investigation into the two burglaries is ongoing and more arrests are possible.
