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differentiating your teaching and learning how to meet the needs of all the students in your classroom."

Manning said he warned his staff to not be overwhelmed by the vast amount of information they would be given.

"We had a faculty meeting before we went and I told them to approach it the same way I told my kids when I would take them to wrestling camp," he said. "I warned them they were going to be immersed in all things and to take one or two things that they want to implement when they get back — not to try to implement them all, because if you try to focus on too many ideas, you won't do any of them justice."

That growth as a teacher in a religious environment and the subsequent benefits for the students and their families is why the Friends of Sacred Heart (FOSH, the parent-teacher association of Sacred Heart Schools) has made it a priority to send the

staff to the conference every three years. FOSH holds bingo nights throughout the year where the funds raised are used to send the staff to this conference.

The school has chosen to go every third year, however, because the conference was regionally located this year, it was only two years since they last attended.

According to Manning there were more than 8,100 people who attended the conference and each of the 23 schools in the Sioux Falls Dioceses were represented.

He said another benefit for him is the ability to network with other administrators of Catholic education.

"It is invaluable being able to share success stories and to share problems trying to find ways other administrators have found to solve problems you might be running into," he said.

The teachers are now working on applying what they have learned and looking forward to even more.

"Part of what being a teacher in a Catholic school is developing the community," Steffen said. "This trip allowed us as a staff to develop our community further."

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our pro day," said Shepard, who has also had conversations with Arizona, Detroit, Houston and Philadelphia. "There should be quite a few options. If I don't get drafted, it might end up working out better for me."

"You just don't know." Through all the talks and workouts with various NFL teams, Shepard said the one consistent comment he has heard has been that he is viewed as a "developmental guy" and a "dual threat" quarterback — meaning one that could both run and throw.

"I wouldn't be brought in to necessarily be a starter in the NFL, but could be a third string or a backup," he said. "There are some amazing quarterbacks in the NFL, so breaking in is hard enough. I'm just taking baby steps to see what happens." Included in those small steps has been an increased workout regimen, one Shepard says now includes running six times a week and lifting weights four times a week. He also said he's

studied up on game film of NFL quarterbacks — if nothing else, to compare himself to potential teammates.

It's quite a change from his days as a USD quarterback. "At times, it's kind of tough, because I'm so used to training for spring ball," Shepard said. "Now, I've been training and staying in shape the whole year."

When the NFL Draft begins tonight and continues through Saturday, Shepard will be watching at his aunt's house in Lakewood, Colo., along with family members and close friends — all people Shepard said "who have been with me whole life, encouraging me to succeed."

The fifth-year USD senior also got words of encouragement from former Coyotes A.J. Schable, a former NFL player and current UFL player, and Stefan Logan, a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

"A.J. talked to me a little bit about his experiences coming out of USD and how he handled everything," Shepard said. "He gave me some good advice. Same thing with (Logan); he told me to keep at it and not give up your dream."

"And that's what I'm doing: keeping that alive."

on the ground. Phelps-Roper is scheduled to stand trial in August in Sarpy County Court on charges of violating the flag law, disturbing the peace, contributing to the delinquency of a minor and negligent child abuse stemming from the protest.

Nebraska's law against flag desecration bars intentionally "casting contempt or ridicule" upon a U.S. or Nebraska flag by mutilating, defacing, defiling, burning or trampling it. State law also prohibits picketing within 300 feet of a funeral or memorial services. The law applies one hour before services begin and two hours after they conclude.

Violators of either law face a misdemeanor charge.

Smith Camp's decision allows Phelps-Roper's lawsuit to go ahead on claims the protest law is unconstitutional. Questions about the Bellevue ordinance were thrown out because the city had repealed it.

Also dismissed was a proposed settlement between Phelps-Roper and Bellevue officials. According to terms of the settlement included in court documents, the city and its employees, including police officers, would not enforce the state's flag and protest laws, would agree the charges against Phelps-Roper were not justified and would not testify in the criminal case, among other things.

Smith Camp ruled that although Bellevue officials had agreed to the settlement, state defendants in the case had not, so the court couldn't approve it.
