Springfield To Hold Two Recounts Today

SPRINGFIELD — Recounts will be held today (Friday) for two alderman seats on the Springfield City Council. Both races fell within the five-vote margins that allow a candidate to request a recount.

In Ward I, incumbent Brian Jones defeated challenger Greg Stockholm 59-57. In Ward III, Greg Walpole defeated Bruce Waage 55-51 in a battle of newcomers as incumbent Al Gimbel didn't run for re-election after 21 years in office.

Both Jones and Waage filed written requests for recounts by the 5 p.m. Thursday deadline, according to the Springfield city finance office.

The Ward III recount will be held at 1:30 p.m., while the Ward I recount will be held at 2:30 p.m. Both recounts will be held in the Community Services Center board room.

The three-member recount boards will consist of a representative designated by each candidate and a third person chosen by City Finance Officer Candace Grassel.

The final results should be known by this afternoon, according to the finance office.

The Springfield mayor's race was more decisive, as incumbent Norm Schelske defeated challenger Kenneth Yule 183-154 for a two-year term.

The mayor's race saw 59 percent voter turnout, while the Ward I contest saw 64 percent and Ward III saw 55 percent.

Lake Andes Murder Sentencing Postponed

LAKE ANDES — Sentencing has been delayed until next month for a Mission woman convicted of manslaughter in the stabbing death of her boyfriend.

Jennifer (Meek) Ladd, 37, was found guilty in the death of Louis Fast Horse, 43, also of the Mission area. The Charles Mix County jury returned the verdict March 1.

The stabbing took place Feb. 15, 2009, at a Main Street residence in Lake Andes.

Ladd was scheduled for sentencing today (Friday) at the Charles Mix County Courthouse in Lake Andes. However, the proceedings have been postponed until May 21 at 9:30 a.m. at the courthouse, according to the Charles Mix County clerk of courts office.

Republican Candidate Forum To Be Held In Tyndall

TYNDALL — Eight Republican candidates for three South Dakota constitutional offices have accepted invitations to attend Monday's forum in Tyndall.

The event, open to the public, begins at 7 p.m. at Corral Cafe, according to Bon Homme County GOP chairman Gary Jerke.

"We have had a lot of gubernatorial and congressional forums, but I think this is the first time that I recall an area forum where we had all the (GOP) candidates for constitutional offices," Jerke said.

The Secretary of State candidates include Jason Gant of Sioux Falls, Theresa Bray of Pierre and Tom Deadrick of Platte.

The State Treasurer candidates include Richard Sattgast and Mike Mehlfah, both of Pierre.

The State Auditor candidates include Pat Miller of Fort Pierre, Steve Barnett of Aberdeen and Tim Rounds of Pierre.

Monday's forum grew out of another regional event, Jerke said.

"A group of us were at a forum for the Republican governor candidates in Parker," he said. "We started talking about how it would be great to have a forum with candidates for the

state constitutional offices."

Jerke said he liked this week's GOP congressional candidate forum in Vermillion and will use a similar format at Tyndall.

A meet-and-greet from 7-7:30 p.m. will allow the audience to talk one-on-one with the candidates in an informal setting, Jerke said. The question-and-answer session is slated to run from 7:30-8:30 p.m.

"With the large number of candidates, we are allowing two minutes for a response to each question," Jerke said.

To help touch on relevant areas, the area's county auditors and registers of deeds have been asked for information and questions related to each constitutional office, Jerke said.

Jerke, a former state legislator, will moderate the Tyndall forum. The event will open with questions by the organizers followed by questions from audience members.

The first round of questions will cover a range of issues and the candidate's qualifications, Jerke said.

A special invitation has been extended to state GOP convention delegates, who will choose the party's nominees for the constitutional offices.

So far, delegates have indicated they will attend from Yankton, Clay, Turner, Bon Homme, Hutchinson, Charles Mix, Douglas and Davison counties.

However, Jerke emphasized the forum is open to the general public, including area high school students. The audience will learn more about the candidates and the offices they are seeking, he said.

"The people should receive a wonderful civics lesson," he said.

The constitutional offices tend to be overlooked by higher profile races, Jerke said. However, these offices carry a great deal of responsibility and oversee the collection and spending of millions of dollars, he said.

Jerke said he is glad to see the statewide candidates campaign in the southeast part of South Dakota. He noted a number of the constitutional office candidates attended this week's congressional forum in Vermillion.

"It's good for them to come to the smaller cities like Yankton and Mitchell and to the rural communities and agricultural area," he said.

"They had about 30 to 35 people at the forum in Vermillion, and we are hoping to have 45 to 65 in attendance at Tyndall."

Jerke would like to start a series of election-year forums in southeast South Dakota.

"If the other towns are willing, I would like to continue having these forums in Parker, Vermillion and Tyndall," he said. "It would make for a strong triangle of forums in this part of the state."
