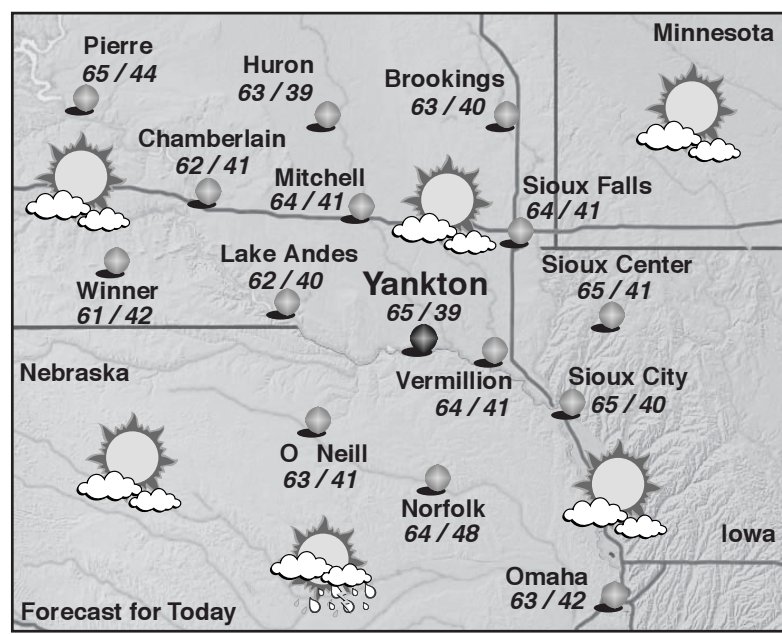

 A triumvirate named by President Roosevelt took over the \$4,880,000,000 work relief drive today and jobless multitudes looked to the capital for definite word as to when they will get work and what they will be paid. Meanwhile, the president of the National Farmers' Holiday association, speaking in Des Moines, turned loose his fury and said "the most destructive and regrettable act in the administration has been the attempt to destroy peoples' confidence in our form of government."

In Berlin, nuns and monks, some of whom were described as aged and feeble, were held today for foreign exchange violations as the cries of speakers in a great anti-Christian German faith movement echoed through the reich.

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

Grains futures were mostly lower Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery sank 17.5 cents to \$4.88 a bushel, while July corn fell 1.5 cents to \$3.595 a bushel and oats for July delivery were unchanged at \$2.13 a bushel. July soybeans lost 1 cent to \$10.09 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures advanced and pork futures fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle edged up 0.68 cent to 95.5 cents a pound; May feeder cattle rose 1.18 cents to \$1.1375 a pound; June lean hogs shed 0.9 cent to 84.27 cents a pound; and May pork bellies slipped 0.15 cent to 95.1 cents a pound.
