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YANKTON COUNTY COMMISSION MEETING April 6th, 2010

The regular meeting of the Yankton County Commission was called to order by Chairman Bruce Jensen at 4:30 PM on Tuesday, March 6th, 2010.

The Board discussed progress on the proposed Highway Shop construction project. Soil borings will be done next week. It is estimated bid letting could occur the first week of June, 2010.

The Board discussed possible solutions to the repair of the col-

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lapsing drainage tile within the town of Gayville. The States Attorney advised the persons who are benefiting from the drainage lateral could formally organize and elect officers and seek financing on their own. The County could attempt to secure financing, but were cautioned that option would in effect make all taxpayers in the county responsible for repayment of any loan. The issue will be returned to the table at the April 20th, 2010 meeting.

Lori Mackey, Director of Equalization, requested permission to purchase software for the DOE office that would consolidate appraising efforts. The estimated cost of the software is \$107,631 for implementation and annual support of \$7,180. The issue will be returned to the table at the May , 2010 meeting.
