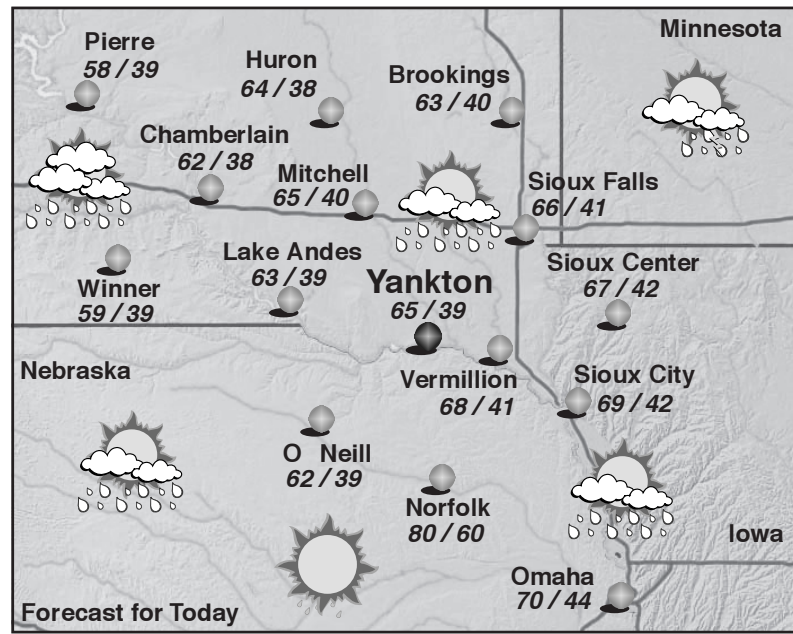

Grains futures advanced Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery jumped 7.5 cents to \$4.955 a bushel, while July corn climbed 5 cents to \$3.69 a bushel and oats for July delivery rose 3.75 cents to \$2.12 a bushel. July soybeans added 2.5 cents to \$9.96 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures traded higher and pork futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle gained 0.45 cent to 93.87 cents a pound; May feeder cattle edged up 0.22 cent to \$1.1252 a pound; June lean hogs lost 0.78 cent to 83.82 cents a pound; and May pork bellies rose 0.2 cent to 97.4 cents a pound.

S.D. Kayak Challenge Slated May 29-30 On Missouri River

The South Dakota Kayak Challenge, a 70-plus mile race on the Missouri River, is set for May 29-30. It starts in Yankton.

The race will begin at 7 a.m. May 29 at Riverside Park in Yankton. Racers who take part will have 36 hours to complete the course. The race ends at Bev's on the River in Sioux City, Iowa.

The deadline to enter the race is May 15. It is open to kayakers, both singles and tandems, as well as canoes, surf skis, and any other craft that is paddle-powered.

Organizer Jarrett Bies, vice president of the South Dakota Canoe & Kayak Association, said the event is a great way to get outdoors and appreciate the beauty of the Missouri River.

"We've modeled our race on marathon/endurance paddling races like the Missouri River 340 and the Texas Water Safari, and those events are only a few years old and already attracting hundreds of racers," Bies said. "We hope to make this an annual event and show off South Dakota's stretch of the Missouri River to more kayakers, canoeists, and paddlers in general."

YSD To Offer Summer Food Service Program In June, July

Yankton School District will again be offering a summer food service program during the months of June and July 2010.

Webster Elementary School will be serving lunch from June 1-July 30 between the hours of 11 a.m.-12:30 p.m. for all students through 18 years old at no cost.

There are no registration or pre-qualification requirements to participate at this site. All students are eligible to receive free meals regardless of race, color, national origin, age, gender, religion or disability. Adults are also welcome to eat lunch for \$2.75 per meal. Webster School is located at 317 E. 17th Street.

Yankton Middle School, located at 2000 Mulberry Street, will be offering a summer breakfast and lunch program from June 1-July 30. Students who qualify for free or reduced price meals are eligible to eat for free at this site. Meal prices for non-qualifying students will be \$1.25 for breakfast and \$2.00 for lunch. Adult prices are \$2.75 per meal. All participants must enroll to participate at the middle school serving site. Forms are available from all school offices, Grove Administration Building, or by logging on to the school website at <http://www.ysd.k12.sd.us/sfp>. Students may also register on-site during the summer and utilize their regular school lunch accounts at the middle school serving site.

Summer lunch will consist of a different meat entree each serving day (typically one or two alternatives available), choice of a variety of fruits and vegetables, a bread item and a milk. Children do not need an adult to accompany them.
