place for children to learn and grow, and to know that Jesus loves them," he said. "But, we also want them to know that we live in a great country, and that a key reason for our nation being so great is the men and women in uniform. Truly, soldiers are super-heroes!"

St. John's church and pre-school have remained supportive of Gunderson's combat service, said St. John's associate pastor Steve Weispfennig.

"We view it as an extension of our mission," the associate pastor said. "Pastor Dave is our personal missionary with his trip to Afghanistan."

The St. John's pre-school staff and children also feel that bond, said head teacher Patsy James.

"We have Pastor Dave's letters and messages to us. He thanked us as a congregation, and he said, 'You have shared me with the soldiers and people of Afghanistan,'" she said.

"It's hard to have him gone, but we know that's what being a Christian is about. You let the message be spread in all different parts of the world."

The "Soldiers Are Our Superheroes" theme resonates with more than just Gunderson, Weispfennig said.

"At St. John's, we have about 50 to 75 people who are former or current military personnel," he said. "We have a great deal of respect for those who serve. Dave's involvement with the Guards gives even more recognition for the military and the congregation."

That sense of respect and connection with soldiers is likewise found among the St. John's pre-school staff and children, James said.

"While Pastor Dave is gone, he is in our thoughts and prayers," she said. "We never forget what this (deployment) means for all of us. We need to tell him and other soldiers 'thank you.'"

tardy road reports since the early February incident near Summit on I-29.

"It's unfortunate a mistake like that, or a situation like that, has to occur, but that's the way we learn," Madeja said. Madeja said AAA relies on the state's road reports when members call for information on winter driving, and he appreciates the DOT's efforts to make sure information is up to date.

"We are very grateful and thankful of the measure that has been put in place to make sure it doesn't happen again," he said.

Some motorists said they got stranded on I-29 during the early February blizzard because the 511 system did not warn them of how bad conditions had become. While they waited for their cars and trucks to be freed from snow drifts, stranded motorists were taken to a Sisseton casino, a highway rest area near Wilmot and a truck stop in Summit.

A National Weather Service official said the area's topography contributed to the unusual conditions because winds accelerated as they came off a ridge in the area. While wind speeds in most of northeastern South Dakota were only 5 mph to 15 mph that night, they ranged from 30 mph to 40 mph in the area known as the Sisseton hills and a peak gust hit 56 mph just before midnight.

Cars and trucks stopped on the roadway because drivers could not see through the blowing snow.

Bergquist said the DOT has established a more formal procedure so officials check to make sure information on 511 and Safe Travel USA is current. The department's Division of Operations is divided into 12 areas, three each running under four regions. Area engineers make sure road condition reports are updated, and each regional engineer monitors the areas in that region, Bergquist said.

The state director of operations in Pierre watches the entire system, Bergquist said. "Hopefully, we never run into that situation again where we have people on the road and conditions are not being updated," Bergquist said. "If we run into that situation, we've got somebody to catch it immediately and make sure it's corrected."

James's father served during the Korean War, and she has other family members who are veterans. Other pre-school staff and the children likewise know someone who has served in the military, she said.

"This (deployment) hit me personally," she said. "This theme strikes home with the kids because so many of them have family members who have served with Charlie Battery (of the National Guard) or with other units. They can relate to a parent, an uncle or a grandpa who has been in war."

The 72 children in St. John's pre-school, ranging from ages 3-6, are carrying out the "Soldiers Are Our Superheroes" theme in a variety of ways, James said.

The events include dressing as superheroes during the week; dressing one day in red, white and blue; holding an "Uncle Sam" hat day; and hosting a Parent Appreciation Night with the opportunity to sign cards for soldiers in Afghanistan.

This week's activities bring home many lessons, including praying for the soldiers' safety, James said.

"We have talked about Pastor Dave being overseas with other soldiers. We tied it in with superheroes," she said. "We talk about the flag and what it means. We talk about the soldiers who make sure that we are always able to pray and celebrate the flag."

The students have also filled the hallways with life-size colored cutouts of themselves as superheroes, James said.

But one wall carries a striking life-sized silhouette of a soldier, flanked by the U.S. flag and the Lutheran flag. The display ties together the themes of service, patriotism and faith.

The display may have been inspired by Gunderson's unexpected appearance at the church and school, shortly before his deployment, wearing his camouflage outfit, said pre-school teacher Christy Hagge.

"Pastor Dave led a Bible study in his (military) uniform before he left (for Afghanistan)," she said. "It allowed people to see him in that role."

The pre-school staff and students are offering more than their prayers for Gunderson and fellow soldiers, James said. "We have sent care packages to soldiers, along with cards, letters and email," she said.

The students' acts of kind-

ness and generosity are not lost among the soldiers serving in combat, Gunderson said.

"This year, St. John's has sent countless care packages for the men and women at this camp. The pre-school is also in on this project by sending cards made by the children," the chaplain said.

"Cards like these are precious as they are passed out to the soldiers here. Each card brings a big smile to the soldier as they know that people, including little children, are remembering and honoring them."

While remembering the soldiers, the pre-school has not forgotten the Afghans who have been caught in the war, James said.

"In the past, we have sent shoes and toys for the kids, along with blankets and school supplies," she said. "Our kids have really connected, realizing how little that other children have in those countries."

The collection of relief items has reinforced the importance of sharing among the St. John's students, Hagge said. "They think more about others," she said.

St. John's Church and pre-school received a special reward for their support of Gunderson and their acts of kindness for other soldiers and the Afghan people. In February, St. John's received the Department of Defense's "Pro Patria Award," one of the highest honors bestowed through the Employers in Support of the Guard and Reserves (ESGR) program. St. John's received the honor during the "Legislative Dining Out" ceremony in Pierre.

Gunderson said this year's Lutheran Schools Week will hold a special meaning for him as he nears completion of his mission. He said he continues keeping

St. John's parishioners and pre-schoolers are anxiously anticipating Gunderson's return, Weispfennig said.

"Pastor Dave has a sense of humor. When he's around, the jokes are flying," Weispfennig said, admitting he can't match Gunderson's puppet show featuring a raccoon.

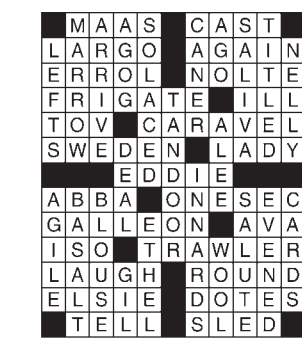
On a serious note, Weispfennig said St. John's — including the pre-school children — is praying for Gunderson's safe return.

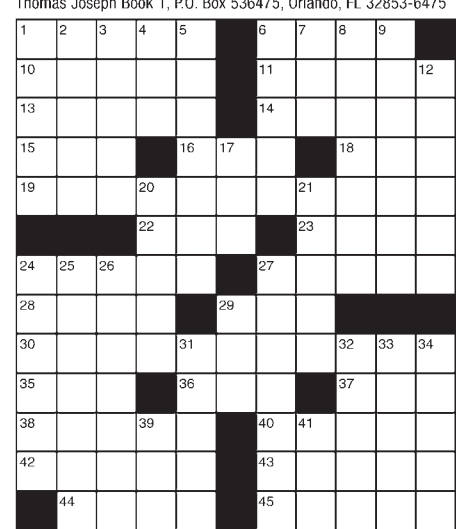

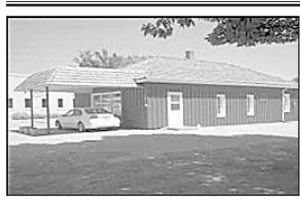
