this for, the women have asked me to come back and do it again," she said.

Some areas are also planning to hold meetings on a regular basis.

A group in Sioux Falls is planning on meeting once each month, seeking to grow in size and provide members an opportunity to meet other women veter-

erans. Similar groups are also forming in Aberdeen and Watertown.

McGrath said she would like to see the same thing happen in Yankton, and she hopes enough women will attend Wednesday's open house to make that a possibility.

"Just stop by for a piece of cake and get to know us. You have nothing to lose," she said. "I think women will be very surprised at what VA has for them, what we have done to meet their needs and how we continue to listen to them and improve to meet their needs."

When I moved to Yankton, I felt it was important to become involved. I have enjoyed working with the Yankton Optimists, Yankton Regional Aviation Assn., Big Friend Little Friend, the Young Eagles program, Chamber of Commerce, and my church, Trinity Lutheran. The Yankton community has been good to me and has been a great place to raise my family. I would like to give back to the community by serving as a city commissioner. I am a problem solver and enjoy working with people.

When it comes to economic growth, do you believe there are opportunities that the City Commission and its economic development allies have not fully explored? Do you have any ideas on how the city could improve its economic development approach?

As far as economic development goes, there are things we can do better especially with our East entrance to Yankton. Yankton's east entrance has been an ongoing concern for many people who live and move here. We have done much, but we need to take it to the next level. In addition, we must continue to work with the Menards development to make sure we develop North Yankton to best fit the needs of Yankton, not only for Menards but also for the businesses that want to locate in the area.

At the same time, we must not lose focus on the city's main functions such as offering high quality water, sanitary services and protection. I think we need to continue working with YAPG and others in regards to economic development.

Renovation of the Meridian Bridge into a recreational trail is set to conclude this year. The city had done a lot of planning for the downtown area to prepare for this eventuality. Once the renovation is complete, what steps do you think the city needs to take to capitalize on this unique project?

The city has done a wonderful job in the renovation of downtown Yankton, and it is now time to enhance the entrance to the walking bridge. I look forward to helping take the design to next level to make sure it's functional and at the same time doesn't cost so much.

Any closing thoughts?

All and all, I will be a good listener and a common sense leader as a commissioner. I want to be a link from the average person to the commission and staff to improve our quality of life. I love this community, and I will do all I can to make it a place where family and businesses will want to live. A vote for me will not go to waste.
