BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded lower or flat Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for May delivery rose 2.75 cents at \$7.89 a bushel; May corn fell 5 cents to \$7.6175 a bushel; May oats were unchanged at \$3.9150 a bushel; while May soybeans jumped 12.75 cents to \$13.86 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle edged down 0.50 cent to \$1.1950 a pound; May feeder cattle fell 0.57 cent to \$1.3710 a pound; June lean hogs fell 0.50 cent to \$1.0275 a pound; while May pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.2000 a pound.

class to excel in reading and English.

"I had a student who took my literature class, and she came back from college and said she breezed through it because of her experiences here," he said. "She had already been exposed to it in my class. She knew about Homer, Dante, Shakespeare, all the classics."

But the English program doesn't benefit just a select few, Dooley said. "I had one student, who isn't going to college, who came into my classroom after reading Dante's 'Inferno' and wondered where he could get more," he said.

A group of Bloomfield seniors said the class always strives for excellence.

"We work hard and play harder," said Jonathan Carhart, flashing a grin.

The students readily admitted they love to compete, not only against other schools but among themselves.

"This class is very competitive, whether it's for the honor roll, the science fair or the football playoffs," said Tanner Schumacher. "We take a lot of pride."

The governor's spotlight brings academic recognition to a school already known for its athletics.

"It shows that we are (among) the best. It's exciting to know it," said Brian Hamilton.

"We like the recognition," said Shante Conway.

"I feel kind of important," Brett Hopkins added.

While excelling in school, the students also love to read for their own enjoyment.

"I'm a speed reader," Conway said. "I enjoy realistic fiction, maybe science fiction. I also enjoy something from the 1960s."

Bloomfield students receive individual attention, which contributes to their academic success, Conway said. She contrasted her senior class of 20 with her former school, one of the largest districts in South Dakota.

The Bloomfield staff remains focused on the whole student, Dooley said.

"You can't get lost here and fall through the cracks," he said. "We know our students as people, what makes them click."

While recognized for their academics, most Bloomfield students remain active in activities while keeping up their studies, Dooley said.

"They do well and have fun doing it," he said. "The small schools have a lot of opportunities, and our students are very well rounded."

Bloomfield grooms its students well for the future, Carhart said. "The kids here compete and feel prepared (after graduation)," he said.

The Bloomfield school district has committed itself to

strong reading skills for its students, Lingenfelter said. The commitment includes early and frequent testing of students during their school career, with additional help for those who need it. An accelerated reader program pushes students to higher levels.

Despite a tight budget, the Bloomfield school board has shown its support by hiring two new part-time paraprofessionals, Lingenfelter said. The Bloomfield district also works with the Educational Service Unit (ESU).

As the state assessment test showed, the investment has paid off, she said.

"This has been a team building approach, and the staff has bought into it. We want the best for students," she said. "Reading is so critical to all areas. We're doing our kids a disservice if we don't place a focus there."

Bloomfield uses technology in the classroom but doesn't use it as a substitute for good teaching, Dooley said. "We don't forget the basics," he said.

Placing among the state's top school districts has raised the bar for Bloomfield students and staff, Lingenfelter said.

"It's amazing, and it has boosted everyone's morale," she said. "It's a great group of kids who deserve it."

Dooley agreed, noting the students push themselves.

"It's a group of amazing kids who always want to do their best," he said. "They don't want to fail one another."
