## Dig Safely, Use S.D. One Call

PIERRE — The South Dakota Public Utilities Commission and the South Dakota One Call Board remind excavators and homeowners to call 811 before digging for their own safety as well as to protect utilities.

South Dakotans are required by law to call 811 at least 48 hours before digging. Following a call, the call center notifies utility company representatives in the dig vicinity so companies can mark the approximate location of underground lines with spray paint or flags. Once a site has been marked, it is safe to dig away from the marked line areas.

"It is essential for anyone planning a project involving digging to make the call to 811 well in advance," said PUC Chairman Steve Kolbeck. "This applies not only to homeowners, but to contractors, fence builders, landscapers, and anyone digging within the state. The result of not calling 811 and paying attention to the line markings before digging can result in expensive fines and fees, harm to the individual digging, and even death. There is simply too much at stake by ignoring the 811 call and this law."

"Our mission as a board is to protect personal safety and minimize damage to utility lines in our state," said One Call Board President Bleau LaFave of NorthWestern Energy. "We continually remind those who excavate

as part of their regular business routine as well as homeowners to follow safe digging practices. We have come a long way since the inception of the 811 number in 2005, but we must continue to get the word out to protect South Dakotans."

In 2010, the South Dakota One Call Center received more than 112,000 locate requests. As a result, more than 597,000 locate tickets were issued to utilities to mark underground facilities.

According to Common Ground Alliance, an international association promoting damage prevention practices, the most popular homeowner digging projects are planting shrubs and trees, and digging in preparation of pouring concrete. These do-it-yourself projects could cause serious damage if the individual digging is not aware of the location of buried utilities. CGA advises homeowners planning weekend projects to call 811 on Monday or Tuesday to allow ample time for companies to mark lines in advance of digging.

After his practice session last Monday, Lear took the time to speak to a group of children that were at the complex. While archery was certainly part of the discussion, the children also learned a lesson in life.

"Anyone can become disabled at any time, through illness or injury, or something else," he told them. "If something like that happens, it doesn't mean that your life is over. You just have to keep going."

Lear has spent much of his life doing just that.

After he retired from the U.S. Marine Corps in February 1967 (his injuries occurred in October 1966), Lear earned his bachelor's degree in accounting from Armstrong College (Berkeley, Calif.). He is married to his wife Carol and has three children, three stepchildren and six grandchildren. He is actively involved in the Third Battalion Fourth Marines Association and the Vietnam Veterans of America, and is also a member of the Military Order of the Purple

Heart and the Disabled Veterans of America.

Lear got involved in competitive archery in 2001 when he participated in the National Veterans Wheelchair Games. The sport caught his interest, and he began shooting in indoor leagues. In 2002, he began shooting outdoors and shot in his first national outdoor tournament in 2003. Since then, he has been a member of the 2004 and 2008 U.S. Paralympic teams, and he hopes to qualify for the 2012 Paralympic Games in London.

"It's fascinating to be able to shoot, and to be able to have the opportunity to represent our country is even more rewarding," he said. "One person asked me what it felt like to represent our country, and I said it was really good to represent my country again, and not be shot at this time."

For most of the tournaments Lear will compete in this year, the targets will be at 70 and 90 meters with an aiming dot that is 12 centimeters in diameter. The competitions take place wind, rain or shine, with the only exception made for lightning.

Lear said that since it is difficult to get a wheelchair in the

same exact place every time, the rules allow Paralympic archers to stay on the line. While this can be good for accuracy, the conditions can become tough to endure.

"When these guys go out there, they are there for the duration," Rogers said. "It can get rather hot out there, and these guys have to stay in the sun, whereas able-bodied archers can go find some shade and get a break from that."

Rain can also be a problem. Lear recalled an event several years ago in Redding, Pa., where the range became flooded due to large amounts of rain.

"You had archers shooting in water up to their knees. It was hilarious," he said. "I shot that day in the morning and got absolutely drenched. And it stopped raining, and I thought, 'This is not fair at all.' I went back to the hotel room, took a shower, came out and saw a huge black cloud coming over, and then the heavens just opened up. Had I shot in the

afternoon, I wouldn't have been able to shoot because the water came up so high. The wheelchair would have shorted out. So I decided what I did in the morning wasn't nearly as bad as what they did in the afternoon."

While conditions can be daunting at times, Lear said it is well worth it.

"Just the thrill of being able to shoot makes it worth sitting out there in the rain or in the beating sun."

Even though he finds archery extremely rewarding, he said the sport can take its toll mentally.

"Archery is one of those things where one day you can shoot absolutely great, and the next day, you're doing the same thing, but nothing's going right," he said. "So it can be a very frustrating sport from time to time."

Lear said he enjoyed his time at the Yankton archery center working with Rogers, and he plans on returning soon.

"I hope to make a few more trips up here within the next year, if he'll have me back."
