Prairie Chicken Dance Tour Set For Wagner

WAGNER — There are still a few seats available on the Buche Bus heading to view the prairie chickens dancing on Saturday, April 16, at Wagner.

The Buche Bus will leave at 6 a.m. on Saturday to an undisclosed location commonly used for dancing by the prairie chickens. Randall RC&D is sponsoring the event free to the public with the aim of educating people about this native bird and its habitat requirements. Walking is not required and staying on the bus is optional since organizers try to get it as close as they can without disturbing the birds. Binoculars are a must for good viewing of the wary dancers.

Mother Nature controls the biggest factor in being able to view the birds and their mating dance. If it's very windy, cloudy or rainy, the birds usually won't display, make their unusual booming noise or dance.

Along with prairie chickens, sharp-tail grouse may also be seen on this one-hour viewing tour.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks personnel will lead the technical part of the tour, and for those interested, give a short presentation after the tour at Booms Family Restaurant either directly after the one-hour tour or regardless of inclement weather or non-cooperative birds.
