moving object (technical); spinning a tale (scientific); triple take road show (fine arts); Verses! foiled again! (structural); dynamic networks (project outreach); and, big bug's bad day (rising stars).

"In addition to the central team challenge, the second part of the competition is the instant challenge," said team advisor Jenny Rice. "The instant challenges are challenges the teams have to solve without any advance preparation or knowledge of the topic."

The goal of the instant challenge is to put a group's creative problem-solving abilities and teamwork to the test in a short, timed exercise.

"Because the program is all student-driven, my job as their advisor is just to make sure that they have everything they need," Rice explained. "It is considered interference if I help them."

For the Drama Queens, the opportunity to participate in DI is exciting, especially because of the topic.

"My favorite part was probably that we got to incorporate a mythical creature," Bartos said.

"Mine was acting it out, because I was usually the mythical creature so I got to do some pretty wild stuff. It was pretty fun," Rolfs quickly added.

Within their topic, the three team members had to select six of 12 possible countries. Within each of the countries, they were required to research the culture and a mythical creature. The group chose Egypt, Greece, Peru, Italy, New Zealand and China.

"We each took two of the countries and then shared our research with the group," Ellison said. "You have to be able to do a skit where you are given two elements from any of your six countries. You have to be able to connect and incorporate the two to make one big prop. That prop still must use the culture and the mythical creatures of both countries."

The girls said that they did the majority of their research online, and are excited about the opportunity to improve their skills before nationals.

"The people who judged us wrote down notes telling us how to improve," Bartos said. "So we are getting better every time we do it."

Because the Imagination DestiNation program is not school funded, the group is planning fundraisers to come up with the \$4,500 they will need to go to the global finals.

"We have a lot of stuff planned out: raffles, bake sales, jars at the stores — just a lot of different things," Ellison said.

Rice added that they will be selling concessions at the upcoming school play and that a fund has been established at CorTrust Bank where anyone wishing to make a donation can do so.

"We couldn't do it without everyone in the community, especially our parents," the girls said. "We just want to tell everyone thank you."

"When I won the \$500 prize, to me it was a no-brainer that I was going to donate it to the scholarship fund," he said. "We set up the scholarship so that (a nursing student) could end up as an RN."

The scholarship fund is administered through the Benedictine Health Foundation, the ASHH philanthropic arm. The award assists nursing students in the final two years.

The scholarship, first given in 2003, not only honors Lori Schremp but reflects her path to the nursing profession. She was a Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) who continued her studies to become an RN, while also being a mother to two sons.

Lori Schremp had been a dedicated, long-time employee at the Yankton hospital, said Kelly Kathol, executive director of the Benedictine Health Foundation.

"Lori showed such compassion and care for others," Kathol said. Schremp's death shocked the ASHH staff, who held a prayer service and candlelight vigil for the nurse at the hospital following the fatal crash, Kathol said.

Hospital CEO Pam Rezac immediately suggested a scholarship in Schremp's honor, Kathol said. The idea received an immediate and

enthusiastic response, she added.

"The following days, the amount just grew. The first year, they raised \$65,000," Kathol said. "The endowment has been built up so they can use the interest for the scholarship."

Most of the money was raised during that first year, Kathol said. However, the ASHH Foundation continues accepting donations so the endowment can grow and produce more funds, she said.

Since it was established in 2003, the scholarship has made it possible for nursing students to complete their education and start a career, Kathol said.

Applicants are encouraged from any college, Kathol said. The foundation has received applications

from students at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, the University of South Dakota in Vermillion, Mount Marty College in Yankton, South Dakota State University in Brookings, Creighton University in Omaha, Neb., and Dakota Wesleyan University in Mitchell.

"We hope that the scholarship winners come to work for us (at ASHH), and we have had some who do, but that's not a requirement," Kathol said.

Jeff Schremp's donation of his "March Motor Madness" prize continues the legacy for his late wife, Kathol said.

"We are so appreciative that Jeff has named us (the recipient) of this money," she said.

Minn. Appeals Court: Minnows Are Not Fish

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — A northern Minnesota bait dealer is off the hook after the state Court of Appeals ruled that a minnow is not a fish.

Kim Barsness of Baudette was caught by a Department of Natural Resources conservation officer in May 2009 harvesting

minnows in Upper Red Lake. Barsness had a permit to harvest minnows, but he was using equipment with orange DNR tags labeled for infested waters only — equipment the DNR says he wasn't supposed to use there.

The labels are part of a DNR effort designed to stop the

spread of an invasive species, the spiny water flea. Upper Red Lake in northern Minnesota is not infested with the spiny water flea, and the DNR said Barsness wasn't supposed to use equipment labeled for infested waters in the lake.
