Obama To Tour Facebook HQ

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — When President Barack Obama arrives at Facebook headquarters this week, he will be the first sitting head of state to visit the brick-and-mortar home of the social media powerhouse.

He will also be partaking in a unique pilgrimage to the birthplace of this new way to communicate, a trip that has become all but obligatory for politicians like presidential hopefuls, celebrities like Lady Gaga and dignitaries from around the world like Russian president Dmitry Medvedev.

Such visits to the hottest tech companies in Northern California's Silicon Valley offer a traditional chance to connect face-to-face with new-media users, voters, fans and potential donors. But the A-listers of entertainment and government also gain important cachet that comes from fusing their personal images with the technology brands the world sees as the future.

"The big thing is, we've got to make sure emergency people are all aware of what's closed and what is in bad shape," Johnson said.

In other business, the commission discussed how it will respond to changes announced last week by the South Dakota Cooperative Extension Service. The reorganization of the Extension Service is a reaction to losing \$1.2 million in state and federal funds in the upcoming fiscal year.

Regional offices will now be located in Aberdeen, Faith, Mitchell, Pierre, Rapid City, Sioux Falls and Watertown.

For fiscal year 2011, Yankton County allotted \$149,286 for Extension, which includes 4-H. The figure includes the salary of about \$32,000 for the 4-H/youth specialist, along with Extension office expenditures and travel.

A new 4-H/youth specialist was hired by the county just before the reorganization was announced, and she is still expecting to begin her position this spring.

"We know we have some hard decisions we have to make about what we want our Extension service here in Yankton County to be," Commissioner Donna Freng said. "There are probably a lot more questions than answers right now."

She said the Extension Service has offered to meet with the commission.

"I think we need to do this as soon as possible," Freng stated. "We have people whose jobs are dependent upon this."

Commissioner Allen Sinclair added, "Meeting with those folks from the Extension office, they'll be able to tell us what services they can provide."

The commission will request to

meet with Extension officials at 2 p.m. May 10 in the commission chambers. A second date of 3 p.m. May 17 will be proposed if that doesn't work.

Also Tuesday, County Auditor Paula Jones said Gov. Dennis Daugaard's office is taking applications from communities to be designated as Capital for a Day. Activities for the day would include a round-table lunch between the governor and community leaders, followed by a community roundtable meeting. In addition, Gov. Daugaard and other state officials would talk with constituents.

Commissioner Garry Moore, a former state legislator, was not interested in applying, arguing that he believes it will cost local residents money to bring the governor to the area.

"It doesn't say anything about paying for anything," Sinclair said.

"You know there is expense incurred," Moore responded. "There are telephone lines that they need to have set in place. They need to have communications put in place. I know how the program works. I'm not a fool. I wasn't born last night."

Moore went on to criticize the governor and the Legislature for cutting funding to various programs.

"You can see what the state did for us this year," he said. "They're pulling funding out of the Veteran's Service Office. They're pulling funding from the Extension Service. We're (not) getting lots of money coming down for roads and bridges. We've got bridges to replace and no money to do it with. We're not getting any help or cooperation out of the state of South Dakota, but they want to move the capital around this state. They ought to stay in Pierre, save some money and pass a few dollars back."

Freng said the things Moore named are reasons why the county should attempt to get Yankton designated as Capital for a Day. It would give con-

stituents the chance to speak with the governor about those and other issues.

"They don't have the opportunity to go to Pierre. That costs money," she said. "If he is going to come here and give the people in this town the chance to visit with him, I'm for it."

People may not agree with everything the governor does, but that shouldn't stop them from inviting the governor to have a dialogue, Sinclair said.

"It gives us a chance, one on one, to visit with him and make other people aware of the issues," he stated.

Moore opposed a motion to cooperate with the City of Yankton on the application process for the designation.

"(Gov. Daugaard will) spend \$40,000 bringing his entourage to all these cities in the state ... which means there will be that much less money available for projects that we need," he said.

Also Tuesday, the commission:

- denied a request to allow local organizers of the National Day of Prayer in May to hang a banner on the grounds of the Yankton County Government Center to advertise the event. It is held annually on the grounds of the facility, but the commission felt it would not be appropriate to allow advertising for the event on government property. Jensen cast a dissenting vote, saying there is no real difference between advertising the event on the property and holding it there;

- approved a \$40,987 bid from First Communications of Tallahassee, Fla., to supply the county with 112 E-911 pagers; and

- was told by Sheriff Jim Vlahakis that the county has begun to utilize its authority to charge for the delivery of warrants. The \$25 charge netted approximately \$600 last month, he said.

Also, everything is done by the students, from choosing topics to assigning stories to putting together rundowns. Students produce all the stories and commercials that air during the show, and students run all of the equipment during a live broadcast.

News TV unique is how the students' jobs are rotated. Except for the anchor and producer positions, the students behind the scenes change their positions every two weeks. These jobs include running cameras, working with audio, running the teleprompter and directing.

"That's what makes it even more impressive," Van Maanen said about the award-winning newscast. "When you are switching positions every two weeks, you can miss a few things. It's just amazing that the students had only been working at those spots for two weeks and they had a perfect newscast."
