Corps To Increase Releases Out Of Fort Randall, Gavins Point Dam

OMAHA, Neb.—The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers announced today that releases from Fort Randall Dam and Gavins Point Dam will be gradually increased beginning early next week.
 "The increased releases are necessary to continue evacuating flood water stored in the Missouri River main stem reservoir system," said Jody Farhat, Chief of the Missouri River Basin Water Management Office in Omaha.
 "Our increases will be timed to match the declines in the tributaries, which enter the Missouri River just below Gavins Point Dam. As always, we will continue to monitor downstream conditions to determine whether any

adjustments to the planned releases are necessary in the days to come," said Farhat.
 Gavins Point releases will be increased from 33,500 to 39,000 cubic feet per second (cfs) beginning on Monday, April 25. They will remain at 39,000 for the remainder of the month. Fort Randall releases will be gradually increased to approximately 35,000 in order maintain the Gavins Point pool at a normal elevation. The spillways at Gavins Point and Fort Randall will be used for the additional releases. Boaters and recreationists should exercise caution in the area around the spillways and remain clear of the buoys.

Adopt-A-Highway Ready For Trash-Off

LINCOLN, Neb. — Everything looks better after a good scrubbing, and Nebraska roadsides are no exception. Adopt-a-Highway volunteers help make Nebraska clean and beautiful by picking up litter during the 2011 Great Nebraska Trash-Off starting April 30 and ending May 14.
 Approximately 3,500 volunteers are hoping for good weather so they can get out there and clear the litter along their adopted section of highway. These vol-

unteers from local organizations and civic groups spend countless hours on litter cleanup, litter that is carelessly tossed out of vehicle windows or purposely left along the highway.
 Sponsored by the Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR), the Adopt-a-Highway program is in its 21st year. Denise Wallman, NDOR Operations Division, is the State Coordinator for the Adopt-a-Highway program.
