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tion will incorporate a city-school library and a wellness center.

Two opt-out renewal information meetings have been held recently, one each in Tripp and Delmont.

While some cuts are being made this year, said Superintendent Lynn Vlasman, "they will be more severe if the opt-out doesn't pass."

Those cuts, he said, include a reduction in force of a part-time counseling position. He said three cuts include federally funded Title I positions in which the hours may be reduced, depending on how the federal budget ends up.

Teacher Ray Hansen is retiring, Vlasman said, so that will allow some shuffling of assignments. He has been responsible for geometry, chemistry and senior math class, as well as acted as the secondary principal.

During the past 15 years, education funding has dropped from 39 down to 32 percent of the state's budget, Vlasman said. In an effort to balance its budget, he said, the state has broken its pledge to increase state aid by the amount of inflation or a maximum of 3 percent each year.

Last year, the state gave no increase, and this year state aid to education was cut 6.6 percent. There is a potential for 2.2 percent less from the state for the 2012-13 year. He said 93 of the state's 145 school districts have opted out of property tax freezes over the past 15 years. That number is now 88 schools, he said, due to closings and consolidations.

Due to the actions of the Legislature the past two sessions, Vlasman said, more schools are considering opt-outs, including Parkston, Yankton, Andes Central and Avon in this area.

Of the schools that have not opted out, he said, many have not had to because of unique federal aid, such as funding from weigh stations in the Elk Point-Jefferson School District, or available federal money in Wagner.

Cuts to higher education also have resulted in double-digit tuition increases for college students,

Vlasman said.

Commonly suggested solutions, he said, include consolidation, closing school districts, sharing services, cutting extra-curricular activities and finding additional funding at the state level.

As for consolidation, Vlasman said, Tripp-Delmont's district is 251 square miles; Armour's 130 square miles; Avon's, 179 miles; Bon Homme, 316; Parkston, 307 and Scotland, 258. Combining with any of the other districts brings the total to more than 500 square miles.

"Just the geography of the situation does need to be considered," he said.

He added that state aid is still figured on a per-student basis and a larger district can result in new transportation issues. Unless it is combined to one site, there still are utilities, insurance and maintenance costs for each facility.

When districts close, taxpayers become members of neighboring districts — the tax burden does not disappear, Vlasman reminded.

As for sharing services, attempts have been made, especially with the proliferation of sports cooperatives in the state, he said. Tripp-Delmont also has shared services at times, when possible.

Cutting extracurricular activities is a two-edged sword, as these activities cost \$4,000 to \$5,000 per year, with coaching, supplies and transportation.

"If a student leaves your school (to pursue that activity elsewhere), you have cancelled the savings," said Vlasman.

The superintendent noted that the Associated School Boards and several other groups are working under Voices for Children to initiate a vote on a penny sales tax dedicated to education.

Sen. Jim Putnam, R-Armour, had said earlier this year that a one-cent sales tax would solve the deficit problem, bringing in \$160 million, said Vlasman.

"So, the solution depends on whether you believe the current educational funding is adequate," Vlasman said. "If it is not adequate ... people need to let their state legislators know they want something different."

Offsetting Tripp-Delmont's current opt-out has kept its capital outlay request low, said Vlasman. During 2010, that was just \$.71 per \$1,000, while it has ranged, for instance, up to Menno's \$2.96 and Armour's \$1.83. Avon is considering an opt-out of \$3 per \$1,000.

Per \$100,000 of valuation, Vlasman said, a Tripp-Delmont patron would save \$79 per year over the next closest district, or \$2.29 per year over Avon. In consolidation, those districts already have opted out and have a capital outlay.

Opt-outs are everywhere, he said, and education has to be paid for somehow.

"I feel good at what we have been able to do," said Vlasman, noting he was asking the public to keep the opt-out at the same level it has been, despite "significant cuts from the state."

If the opt-out is defeated May 24, secondary teachers at the district's two colony schools will be without jobs, Vlasman said. Those teachers received letters indicating that possibility recently.

High School Band Director Mindee Birnstiehl officially resigned from her position at the April Tripp-Delmont School Board meeting, leaving the option of flexibility in that department, which also may see a decrease in instructor hours for the vocal program.

"I'd like to keep (band) a full-time position," Vlasman said, indicating candidates already have applied for the position, and the district is considering joint programming with other districts in the area.

There will be some other cuts, he said, to find the funding. "The state says they won't use their surplus," Vlasman told the *Press & Dakotan*, "but it's fine for you to use yours."

As for the building project, Vlasman said the board went ahead with the project with "the idea the school will be open for some time."

"Actually it is an investment that will extend the longevity of the school district." He said the board was "going to have to spend \$100,000 out of capital outlay anyway to upgrade the school kitchen, with \$40,000 tied up in ventilation alone."

But, Vlasman admitted, "the timing isn't great."

tions in 14 employment contracts, closure of the Business Research Bureau, reduction in the technology fellows program, elimination of the Computational Science and Statistics Ph.D. program and a 50 percent reduction in the M.D./Ph.D. program.

Abbott said USD sets its budget based in part on what it estimates the state Board of Regents outlines in terms of reductions and increases in tuition fees.

The percentage by which those fees are lowered or raised can benefit the university in terms of what cuts it

needs to make, he said.

"If we had to cut \$2.2 million, and then they turn around and raise tuition by 6.9 percent, that reduces significantly the cut," Abbott said. "(For FY2012), we were cutting 10 percent, and we had a 6.9 percent increase. So then you're left with about a 3.1 to fool with. So in this case, I think a fair statement is that tuition increase approved by the board significantly reduced the cut that we had to take."

USD was only one of many institutions and programs affected by cuts proposed by Gov. Dennis Daugaard in January, and subsequently passed by the state Legislature.

The governor proposed reducing funds by at least 10 percent for each state-funded program.

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between May 7 and May 10, and if they aren't planted by then, he would recommend farmers switch to another crop, such as corn or soybeans.

That scenario could very well happen, as state climatologist Dennis Todey said forecasts do not look promising from an agricultural standpoint.

"In the next two-week period, chances for precipitation look like they are going to stay about average for this time of year, so we don't look like we're going to dry out," he said. "But the bigger issue is the continuation of cooler-than-average temperatures. That is not a good sight for us right now from the ag side."

Todey said the cooler temperatures could possibly extend into early summer, which would continue to cause problems for

area farmers.

Strunk said that more cool, wet weather could further delay corn planting, which generally needs to be completed by June 10. If farmers are unable to finish planting by then, alternative measures would have to be taken. These include preventive planting, using a different type of corn (such as 85-day corn instead of 105-day corn) and planting emergency crops with late-seeding options, such as sorghum, millets and buckwheat.

While many farmers might be growing impatient, Hall said it is important to wait for the right conditions.

"I know they're getting antsy, and they want to get their crop in, but if you have to mud a crop, that's not desirable," Hall said. "When you do that and it dries out, it's like a hard clay, and it's tough for a plant to get through that. There's a great chance of yield reduction in the end."

weakened over time. The last of those gusset plates was reinforced earlier this month, Heiman said.

Once the bearings are replaced, the finger joints on the bridge can also be removed to make way for joints that will be more friendly for pedestrian

uses. The current joints leave a divide in which feet or small tires could become lodged, Heiman explained.

Preliminary electrical work is expected to begin soon, as is installation of a handrail. The latter process will begin from the Nebraska side of the bridge.

"We're hoping we'll get this project completed this summer, so the citizens of this area can enjoy this landmark," Heiman said.
