Yankton Earns Tree City USA Designation

Yankton was recognized by the nonprofit Arbor Day Foundation as a Tree City USA community for its commitment to urban forestry. Yankton has earned this national designation for 28 years. The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in cooperation with the National Association of State Foresters and the USDA Forest Service. Yankton has met the four standards to become a Tree City USA community. Tree City USA communities must have a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, a comprehensive community forestry program, and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

"We commend Yankton's elected officials, volunteers and its citizens for providing vital care for its urban forest," said John Rosenow, chief executive and founder of the Arbor Day Foundation. "Trees provide numerous environmental, economical and health benefits to millions of people each day, and we applaud communities that make planting and caring for trees a top priority." Communities that earn Tree City USA recognition not only have taken the time to meet the four standards, they know that trees:

- Promote healthier communities by filtering the air we breathe by removing dust and other particles.
  - Moderate climate, conserve water and provide vital habitat for wildlife.
  - Reduce the heat island effect in urban areas caused by pavement and buildings.
  - Increase property values and reduce energy use and add beauty to our homes and neighborhoods.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded higher Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.  
 Wheat for July delivery jumped 26.50 cents to \$8.6125 a bushel; July corn gained 24 cents to \$7.6850 a bushel; July oats were up 10.50 cents to \$4.0750 a bushel; while July soybeans rose 6.75 cents to \$13.9650 a bushel.  
 Beef and pork futures traded down or flat on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle fell 2.42 cents to \$1.1280 a pound; August feeder cattle shed 3 cents to \$1.3395 a pound; June lean hogs fell 1.53 cent to 98.52 cents a pound; while May pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.2650 a pound.
