their final projects to a respected group of active professionals, other than in a class setting like this?" Halbur said. "Mental health occupations are a diverse field that most students probably don't even think about when considering what career to pursue after high school. This class will hopefully address those needs and expose students to the variety of great positions right here in Yankton that will be available to them after high school. Successful completion of this class should support students' career decisions and their future pursuit of health-related occupations."

According to Charlie Barron, school psychologist for the Yankton School District, health care careers are some of the fastest growing occupations across the nation. He added that the Yankton community is recognized as a regional leader in providing profes-

sional medical care.

"If we can expose our kids to the opportunities right here in the Yankton community, that is a win for both the students and the city of Yankton," he said. "The more students we can retain in Yankton, the better."

Mental Health Care and Careers In Our Community class dates are June 1-3 and 6-10. The class will be held at Southeast Job Link, 1200 West 21st Street, Yankton.

Yankton High School students successfully completing the class will be eligible for an elective half-credit, which has been approved with unanimous support by the Yankton School District Board. Students from other districts may also be eligible for credit, pending approval by their school.

Class size is limited. Pre-registration and pre-payment of the \$50 fee is required; scholarships may be available for students showing financial need.

have covered a wide range of subjects, from horses to World War II.

"Whatever it might be, I try to find a book that they want to read," he said. "And if they want to read, they'll learn to read better and better."

Wright's generosity doesn't stop at books, however. If there are supplies that the school sorely needs, he will do what he can to help out.

For instance, when the school was low on laminating sheets and unable to afford more, Wright purchased a roll and gave it to the teachers.

"You would have thought I had given them a gold bar," he said with a laugh. "They thought that was incredible."

Wright and his business also show their appreciation for the school's staff by bringing them breakfast once a year.

"It's not about the dollars, it's

about the sentiment we're trying to convey," he said. "We appreciate the job that the teachers at Beadle do."

Wright first started working with students at Webster Elementary School, where he attended school as child, as part of the Adults and Children Together (ACT) program. When Paula Weydert, the teacher he was working with, transferred to Beadle Elementary, Wright followed suit, and has been helping her at the school ever since.

Wright said that even after all these years, he enjoys meeting with the students as much as ever. He also plans to continue his work with the school, even if his efforts aren't always remembered.

"Now that I've been doing this this long, I have students who have graduated from college and are a part of the community," he said. "I see these students around town and when I travel, and maybe they remember me and maybe they don't. But I think at some point in time, I've been a part of their lives and I've contributed something, and that's what's important."
