2011, the girls finished in an unsatisfactory 11th place. It is that dissatisfaction that

drives the girls this year. "Last year didn't really turn out the way we expected," senior and SDSU commit, Jenna Grossenburg explained. "We know what we are capable of and our results last year definitely did not show that. This year we're aiming to not let that
