State Welcomes Navigant's Third S.D. Location

PIERRE — Navigant Consulting, Inc. (NYSE: NC) a Chicago-based global consulting firm with locations in Mitchell and Plankinton, will be expanding its presence in South Dakota with a new location in Vermillion, local officials recently announced.

The expansion is expected to bring an additional 50-60 jobs to the area by the end of the year, and 120 by the end of 2013.

"I couldn't be more pleased with this announcement," said Pat Costello, Commissioner of the Governor's Office of Economic Development (GOED). "This company is growing its footprint and making a significant investment in our state."

While Navigant works in a number of industries – including healthcare, energy, and financial services, the office in Vermillion will be part of the national medical billing and coding

offerings. Navigant currently has similar offices in Mitchell and Plankinton.

The company is receiving matching workforce development funds for the project in Vermillion, as well as to increase employee numbers at its Mitchell location. In the next year, Navigant expects to add new positions in Mitchell as well.

"As any businessperson knows, a ready and trained workforce is vital to any operation," said Costello. "By helping to prepare employees from within our state, we are bettering our workforce as well as assisting a great company."

Steve Howe, Executive Director of the Vermillion Area Chamber & Development Company, said Navigant is going to be a great fit in Vermillion.

"Navigant has a great reputation not only in

South Dakota, but across the globe as well," said Howe.

Bryan Hisel, Executive Director of the Mitchell Area Chamber & Development Corporation, echoed similar sentiments about the company's presence in Plankinton and Mitchell.

"This is a company that is already established in our region and we welcome their continued growth," Hisel said. "Navigant has proven to be an excellent employer offering good jobs in an office environment."

My ability to listen and my experience. I believe I have been an integral part of the move for open communication between the board and the public. I appreciate the participation the public has provided. I want that to continue and grow.

3. What is the biggest issue you see facing the Yankton School District and why?

Aside from the "elephant" in the room, funding, I see major challenges will be adopting new policies that replace No Child Left Behind (NCLB), implementing common core curriculum and responding to unfunded federal and state legislative mandates.

4. If elected to the board, do you see a need to repair the apparent disconnect between the direction of the district and a majority of voters in the community? If so, do you have ideas to address this?

Communication is always key to solving challenges. I have supported policy change for more

open discussion and more transparency at our board meetings. All our meetings are now taped and available for viewing at the convenience of each citizen. The board listened to the voters in the first opt-out and adjusted for the second attempt. I am confident we can continue to work together for all taxpayers in the community.

5. Why should you be elected to the board rather than your competitors? What do you offer that they do not?

Education is a privilege each person has not only in school but beyond. I am one of the first

25 school board members in South Dakota that was awarded the Governance Academy for Visionary Education Leadership (GAVEL) Certification through ASBSD. My experience, leadership and my dedication to continue the tradition of a great education in Yankton is what I offer the citizens of the district.

6. Final thoughts?

I have welcomed all the input I have received from people in the district during my first term on the board. I would appreciate your vote on April 10. I look forward to serving my district for another term.
