# Herbster A.D. Finalist At Winona State

WINONA, Minn. - University of South Dakota senior associate athletic director David Herbster is one of three finalists for the athletic director position at Winona State University.

The three finalists will participate in on-campus interviews in the coming weeks. Candidate Brian DeAngelis will be on campus April 9 Wavne State (Neb.) athletic director Eric Schoh on Ápril 13 and Herbster on April 16.

Herbster has been at South Dakota since 2007 and oversees and manages all external revenue generating efforts for the department. He is also the supervisor of seven athletic teams, including football and women's basketball. As the school transitioned to NCAA Division I competition, Herbster developed and implemented a \$10 million scholarship campaign that has currently generated more than \$4 million. He also reorganized annual fundraising campaigns that have increased donors by 75 percent and dollars by 63 percent. Herbster holds a bachelor's degree in marketing from Virginia Tech and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in sports management from

Virginia Tech. Schoh has been at Wayne State since 2004 and has overseen a number of facility upgrades. He has led the renovation of the school's football stadium while also leading improvement projects for a new weight room, sports medicine facility, and new and renovated coaches and administrative offices. He also oversaw the completion of a new baseball and softball com-

plex DeAngelis is currently the director of athletics at East Central University in Ada, Okla.
