# **YFD: Put Out Your Campfires On Sandbars**

The flooding along the Missouri River in 2011 created a new landscape below Yankton that plenty of recreational users are taking advantage of this spring. However, the Yankton Fire Department is asking that the public utilize the new sandbars responsibly.

"There is a lot of firewood on some of those sandbars where it got washed up," Deputy Fire Chief Larry Nickles said. "People are going down there to party, fish or whatever, and they're walking off and letting their campfires burn."

The result in a handful of cases is that those fires are called in to the dispatch center. The department has been deployed in a couple instances.

'We're getting calls from peo-

ple walking on the Meridian Bridge or people driving across the Discovery Bridge saying there's a fire," Nickles said. In one case, the individuals

had used a tire as their barricade and left the fire going. 'The tire started burning, and

it looked worse than it was," Nickles said. "We didn't even pull the hose. I crawled down there, drug it to the water, put it out and threw it back up on shore. It still cost us to go down there, though.'

Luckily, the fires have not caused any damage.

In the future, Nickles said he is asking people to use common sense.

"They're welcome to have a campfire, but we want them to be Smokey the Bear when they're done and put it out," he stated.

CASA volunteers underwent a 32hour training program sanctioned by the National CASA Association that taught the skills needed to advocate for an abused or neglected child in the foster care/family court system.

"It was excellent training," Aune said. "I am so very grateful that Sherri has taken the time to train us. She is wonderful, and she needs a big round of applause and support from the community on this.

As official court-appointed advocates, the volunteers are now eligible to be assigned cases and gather information about the children through visits, observations and interviews. Each advocate is assigned one case at a time and will follow that case until it is resolved, Rodgers-Conti

"They make sure that they get a real clear picture of the whole encompassing situation that the children have been in," she said. They talk to the key people in

the children's lives, and they make a relationship with the child and visit with them regularly.

After gathering information, a volunteer then writes an extensive report to aid the judge's decision on the case, Rodgers-Conti

"It's a very unique volunteer opportunity," she said. "They take a case that they have to maintain complete confidentiality about. They have to be willing to spend many months, sometimes a year and a half, working on this particular case.'

Because of the those requirements, it takes a special person to be an advocate, Rodgers-Conti

"A CASA volunteer really has to be dedicated, self-motivated, and most of all, caring," she said.

Rodgers-Conti said that while the advocates are now eligible to be assigned cases, there is only one current case in Yankton County, so the volunteers will have to wait to get started. However, that is definitely a positive sign, she said.

We don't hope to have many abuse cases, so it's a good thing we have more volunteers right now than cases," she said.

"But that's a massive amount of structural alteration to the floodplain," Mestl said.

This alteration could lead to an increase among various bird species that have known to be decreasing, he added.

Mestl said there were "about

five flood events" along the Missouri over the past 48 years, from 1964 through this year. "There were a few more floods

the last half of this time period than before," he said. From 1934 to 1963, the number of floods was actually quite high

by comparison, he said. "I think this was a function of us building the navigation channel, and at the same time not havcomplete system," Mestl said. Without the dams in place, the water had nowhere to go, he said.

Mestl said that it has long been thought that the Historic Missouri River flooded often in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. However, he said he found this was not quite true. In actuality, although the river

saw dramatic rises throughout that period, there was an average of only one flood about every 20 years, he said. "Although we were seeing

these annual fluctuations, most of these were within the confines of the banks," Mestl said.

But due to the fact that it is no longer an annual occurrence, a significant rise along the banks has a different meaning today.

We've lost that ability to manage the river within the banks," Mestl said. "The channel capacity has been changed through channelization and things like that."
