

Health, Medical Professionals Sought For Volunteer Registry

PIERRE — The Health Department encourages doctors, nurses. EMTs and other health providers to mark National Volunteer Week, April 15-21, by registering with the Statewide Emergency Registry of Volunteers in South Dakota (ŠERV "Disasters from Hurricane Kat-

rina to the Joplin tornado have demonstrated that the nation's health and medical professionals are willing to volunteer and provide vital services to stricken communities," said Bill Chalcraft, public health preparedness and response administrator for the department. "SERV SD lets us identify those professionals in advance, verify their credentials, and provide them with disaster training so they're ready to go in the event of a public health emer-

The registry is maintained by the department and can be activated when a healthcare organization, county, other state, or federal agency requests volunteers. Chalcraft noted that registered volunteers choose whether to participate in any response and are not obligated to deploy. Cur-

rently, 784 volunteer healthcare professionals and more than 400 health care students are registered with SERV SD.

In addition to serving as a statewide volunteer registry, SERV SD is also being used by various community organizations such as the Pennington County Medical Reserve Corps, the Emergency Communications Group of the Dakota Amateur Radio Network, and community point of dispensing organizations to manage their membership.

Funding support for SERV SD comes from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, which mandates that states create local systems for the advanced registration of medical and health care volunteers.

Identifying and training a volunteer public health workforce is one part of the department's Health 2020 objective to enhance the state's capacity to effectively coordinate the response to current and emerging public health threats.

Mosquito Control, West Nile Virus Conference Set

PIERRE — South Dakota's annual Mosquito Control and West Nile Virus Conference will be held April 18-19 in Aberdeen. The conference is a joint event of the Department of Health, the Cooperative Extension Service and the North Central Mosquito Control Association and is being hosted by the City of Aberdeen.

The conference is intended for city, county and tribal government officials and employees involved in funding, planning and conducting mosquito control programs on the local level.

Featured speakers include Dr. Michael Kaufman and Dr. Robert Peterson. Dr. Kaufman is Medical Entomology Research Specialist and an assistant professor at Michigan State University. He is considered a world expert on the microbiota of larval mosquito habitats and recently completed a term as president of the Michigan Mosquito Control Association.

Dr. Peterson is Professor of Entomology at Montana State University, where he leads the research, teaching, and outreach program in Agricultural and Biological Risk Assessment. More specifically, the program is centered on comparative risk assessment and includes biotechnology risk, invasive species risk, infectious disease risk, and pesticide risk.

Conference events will take place at the Ramkota Inn, 1400 8th Ave. NW, on Wednesday and move to the Aberdeen Recreation and Cultural Center, 225 3rd Ave. SE on Thursday.

Topics include arboviral surveillance, South Dakota's 2011 West Nile season, weather outlook for the 2012 season, communicating mosquito control risk, potential re-emergence of West Nile virus in South Dakota, and an update from the American Mosquito Control
