

Work To Resume On Ft. Randall Spillway Bridge

The U.S. Army Corp of Engineers is scheduled to resume work repainting the U.S. Highway 18/Highway 281 Fort Randall Spillway bridge on Wednesday, April 11.
One lane of the bridge will be closed to complete the painting in phases. Traffic will be required to stop and take turns going over the structure. A 12-foot width restriction will be in place. Over width traffic will have to take an alternate route.
All work is scheduled to be completed by Aug. 31.
The prime contractor for this project is EVCO National, Inc.

Hunter Education Course Set This Weekend

A South Dakota Hunt Safe/Nebraska Hunter Education course will be held Saturday, April 14, from 8 a.m.-2 p.m. and Sunday, April 15, from noon-4 p.m. at the NFAA Easton Yankton Archery Complex.
The course is sponsored in part by the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks and The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission. There will certified instructors for both states teaching the 10-hour course.
Successful completion of this course is required by law of every person under the age on 16 who wishes to hunt in South Dakota and Nebraska. Residents of either state must be 11 years of age or older to take the course. Parents are encouraged to attend. There is no charge to take the course.

and Nestle, trash bags from Glad and orange recycle bags from the South Dakota Department of Transportation.
In addition, the City of Yankton will donate a truck to collect garbage, Knology has donated posters and marketing support, and the Outdoor Channel provided marketing support and door prizes. Items to be given away include a backpack, golf shirt, sweatshirt, T-shirt, cap and travel mug.
Members of KYB canvass the community in early April and rate which roadways are most in need of attention. Based on that priority list, volunteers are dispatched on Saturday.

Oftentimes, groups get their assigned section cleaned within an hour of going out, Perakslis said.
"Then they just have to leave their trash bag, tie it up and we have volunteers who come around to pick them up," she stated.
In years past, some groups have come back after completing their initial assignment and asked for additional routes.
"I think people get invigorated by it, and they're glad to do something for the community," Perakslis said. "Kids love it, and people really have a good time when they come out."
Great American Cleanup events are not limited to Saturday, she added.
Various schools, businesses and other organizations schedule events to clean up their premises or other points of interest in the adjoining weeks, Perakslis said.

Many of the schools have events planned for this year, as does the Boys and Girls Club.
"It's great because you want kids to do this and build a habit of picking up litter," Perakslis said. "When they run around picking up other people's trash, they think twice about throwing their own."
Because of the Great American Cleanup and other efforts undertaken in Yankton to keep the community looking nice, she said many visitors notice.
"Usually, communities this size just don't have the resources to do all the stuff we do," Perakslis stated. "Because Yankton has people that are so willing to give their time and effort, we can do great things here."
