That's a pretty powerful statement, but half of our debt is financed by foreign countries, and China has the largest share."

The federal budget now stands at \$3.6 trillion annually, Thune said.

stamps When you add interest payments on the national debt, that accounts for 62 percent of the federal budget on its own, and it keeps growing at a dramatic level," he said

Of the remainder of the federal budget, 20 percent goes for defense discretionary spending and the final 18 percent goes for non-defense discretionary spending, such as the National Park Service, roads and education, Thune said.
