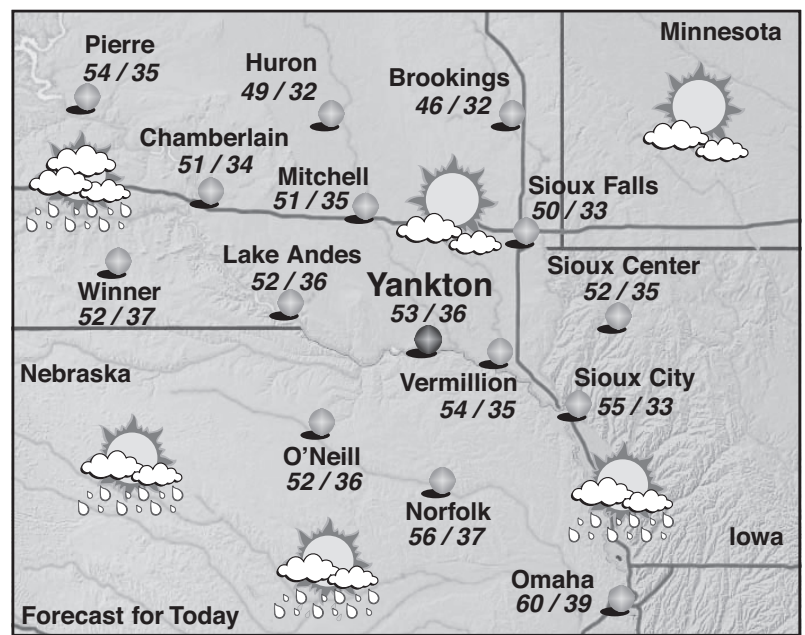

YC Board Of Trustees To Hold Meeting

Members of the Yankton College Board of Trustees will assemble to meet on Friday, April 20, and Saturday, April 21, at the college offices located in the Summit Center in Yankton. The Alumni Advisory Board will meet as well, for a shorter duration, on the morning of April 20.

Held twice each year, these gatherings are concerned with the ongoing affairs of the college as well as outreach to the more than 3,000 alumni world-wide.

Alumni Advisory Chair Ron Bertsch will lead his board to finalize plans for the All-Class Reunion, to be held on July 19-21. The more than 300 alumni who will attend during those days will participate in the giving of awards, the naming of Hall of Fame inductees, tours of the old campus, banquets and gathering of special interest groups.

The Board of Trustees, with the leadership of Chair Joan Neubauer, will spend two days examining the financial status of the college, evaluating the collaboration with Eden Theological Seminary in St. Louis, reaffirming members whose terms have expired, approving the nearly 20 scholarships to be awarded, enacting the Emergency Preparedness Plan formulated in anticipation of grant opportunities and partnering with the Alumni Advisory Board in reunion plans.

The Legacy Committee will meet to continue long-range planning for the preservation of the historic and religious collections held by the College, among other concerns.

Special guests at the Friday afternoon session of the Board of Trustees will be Warden Jordan Hollingsworth and Rev. Dr. Doug Upton, Chaplain, both of the Yankton Federal Prison Camp.

Mueller said the goal this year is to see an increase from 2011, and there's already momentum to do so.

"I'm not really sure what we can expect, but we already have \$200 in donations so far," Mueller said. "We're well on our way."

Those who get involved will get plenty of exercise, Mueller said.

There are seven fitness classes offered next Saturday, including step aerobics, hatha yoga, body sculpting, core fitness, zumba, step/kick and another day-ending hatha yoga session.

Last year, approximately 30 people participated in the classes, Mueller said.

Those who raise money can chose what sessions they want to try.

"Some people donate and don't even go to one of the classes," Mueller said. "Everyone usually has a good time, especially when you're talking working out for a good cause. ... One year we had one guy participate in all the classes."

The "Fitness For a Cause" now becomes one of three major events over the next three weeks

for the Humane Society. HHS hosted a Meet 'n Greet this past Saturday, and the annual Animal Fair will be held Saturday, May 12 at Riverside Park.

"They should help us promote who we are and what we do," Schmidt said.

Beyond that, any amount of money the society can receive will only help, she said. During the first quarter of this year, HHS worked with 70 animals. Schmidt said the organization budgeted for 200 animals this year, but is already on pace for nearly 300.

"Every animal we get receives some sort of care," said Schmidt, who pointed out vet care as the largest expense for HHS. "It allows us to make sure we're adopting out healthy pets."

Though not everyone will adopt a pet from HHS, the cause is a worthy one, Mueller said.

"I think everybody has a good need, especially the Humane Society," she said. "They could use some publicity, because I think a lot of people still aren't completely sure how much good they do in Yankton."

First Round of Ethanol Blender Pump Grants Proves Popular

PIERRE — Gov. Dennis Daugaard has announced that applications have been received for this year's entire first round of grants to help pay for installation of ethanol blender pumps and associated infrastructure.

So far, \$755,000 of the available \$950,000 in grant money has been awarded to South Dakota gasoline retailers.

The Governor's Office of Economic Development (GOED) began accepting grant applications Jan. 9, and a majority of the funds were awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. The final 20 percent of grants will be awarded on a competitive basis. Applications for those grants will be received until April 30.

"To have requests for the total amount of money that is available for the program in this state shows the popularity of a home-grown fuel like ethanol," Gov. Daugaard said. "Making more ethanol blends available to consumers will create more jobs, improve producer opportunities and help stabilize domestic fuel supplies."

Funding for the grant program is made possible by a partnership between South Dakota Ethanol Producers and the State of South Dakota.

South Dakota was the first state to allow ethanol blender pumps. More than 100 pumps currently help support South Dakota's 15 ethanol plants, and nearly 900 South Dakotans are directly employed by the industry.

Hunter Roberts, energy policy director in GOED, said

consumers should soon notice an increase in ethanol blender pumps or flex pumps.

"We are off to a great start. Funds have been allocated to 21 retail stations to install 44 ethanol blender pumps across the state, and four of those projects have been completed," Roberts said. "In addition, we will make another \$950,000 available during a second round of funding that will begin July 2."

Grant awards up to \$25,000 are available for installation of a station's first blender pump. Grants up to \$10,000 are available for installation of each additional pump.

Rick Serie, market development director for the American Coalition for Ethanol (ACE), said the grant program sets a great example for other states.

"With the heavy interest in South Dakota, I'm hopeful other states can see this response and view South Dakota as an effective model on how to improve ethanol infrastructure for both consumers and retailers," Serie said.

GOED, representatives from ACE, and members of the South Dakota Ethanol Producers Association conducted seven informational meetings earlier this year to explain the program to South Dakota retailers and equipment companies.
