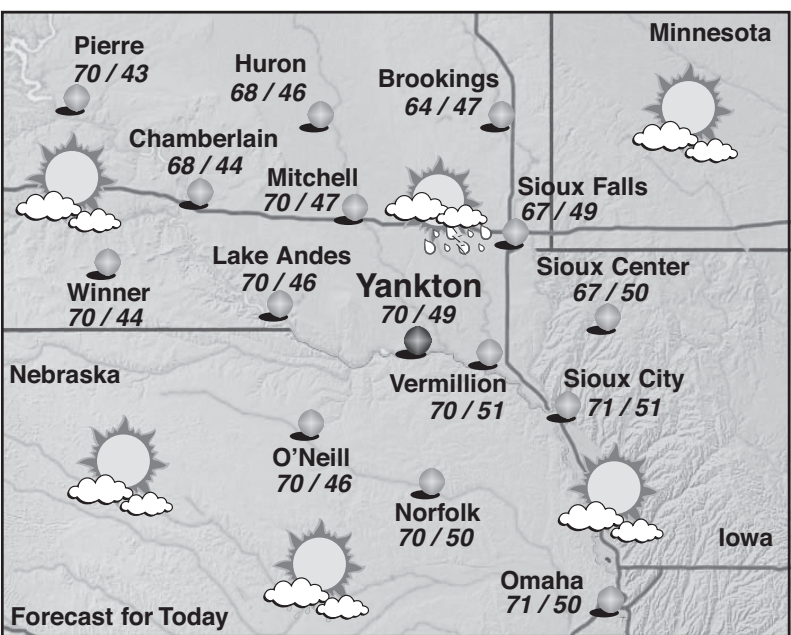

**Yankton Menards Store To Open April 24**

The Yankton Menards Mega Store will open April 24, according to a media release.

The store is located along Broadway Avenue between 31st Street and 33rd Street.

"We are very pleased to announce the opening of this new store, which signifies our commitment to provide the best in home improvement goods and services plus shopping convenience in the Yankton area," Jeff Abbott, a Menards spokesperson, stated in the release. "Homeowners, tenants, business owners and contractors will now have great access to a full-line of building materials and supplies."

The retail development is the result of a partnership between the City of Yankton, Greenbow Real Estate Partners and Menards.

Bonds issued by the city will be used to reimburse Greenbow for such costs as purchasing the property for the retail center; engineering and design work; legal and administrative fees; and other "soft costs" related to developing the site. As the city's sales tax revenues increase when the Menards store opens, it will use 50 percent of that new revenue to reimburse Menards for approved project costs. That payment will be made by Yankton Area Progressive Growth, which is the city's economic development corporation.
