## Super-Efficient \$60 Light Bulb Ready, **But Rebates Will Bring Price Down**

NEW YORK (AP) — How much would you pay for an amazing, state-of-the-art light bulb? Shoppers will be asking themselves that very question at Home Depot and other outlets starting Sunday — Earth Day — when the bulb that won a \$10 million government contest goes on sale.

The bulb is the most energy-efficient yet, lasts about 20 years and is supposed to give off a pleasing, natural-looking light. But what separates it from the pack most is the price: \$60.

That price reflects the cost of the components, especially the top-notch chips, or diodes, that give off the light, and is the price commercial customers will pay. But the manufacturer, Netherlands-based Philips, is discounting it right away to \$50 for consumers, and working on deals with electric utilities to discount it even further, by as much as \$20 to \$30.

This means the bulb will cost anywhere from \$20 to \$60, depending on where it's found. Online, consumers will be paying \$50 for each bulb, because utilities don't subsidize online sales.

"One thing I'm finding out is just agreeing with the manufacturers is giving us a better price than where I was buying a generic brand trying to keep the cost down," Kramer said. 'With our volume being put together, we're able to get a name brand that the kids like to see — and a better product — at a cheaper cost. So we're kind of excited."

The food services director also updated the board on the district's summer food service program, which provides summer lunches for students. The program will be offered from May 29-July 27 at Webster School, with serving times from 11 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Since Webster qualifies as a severe-need serving site, all children up to 18 are eligible to eat at no charge with the cost of the meals subsidized by the National School Lunch Program.

The Yankton Middle School will also serve breakfast and lunch as an enrolled site for the Boys & Girls Club Academy participants, with no fee charged to students who receive free or reduced meals during the school year.

Following the report, the school board approved the summer meal pricing at \$1.50 for student breakfast, \$2.50 per student lunch and \$3 per adult meal.

Also at the meeting, Activities Director Wally Bosch provided a brief report on the Harrisburg School District joining the Eastern South Dakota Athletic Conference beginning in the fall of 2013.

Bosch said Harrisburg had been denied acceptance into the conference when it originally applied a year ago, but the timing of several factors, such as scheduling and reclassification, now sets the conference up well to accept the school as a member for the 2013-14 school year.

"From a Yankton perspective, Harrisburg is a perfect match for us," he said. "In all honesty, that will be our closest trip in the ESD once they come aboard. ... They're very similar to us in size of school and number of kids out for sports and those types of things. So it's really a good fit for Yankton."

Other business during the meeting included:

• canvassing the results of the April 10 school board election;

approving the Yankton Middle School handbook, which included changing the school's start time to 8:25 a.m. with a dismissal at 3:25 p.m.;

• amending the 2012-2013 school calendar to accommodate an inservice day and teacher workday;

• discussing the drafted 2013-14 school calendar with a first day of school for students on Aug. 19, a tentative last day of school on May 16, 2014, and graduation on May 18, 2014.

genius. You were absolutely brilliant," he said. "I was neither. I was just a child.

"I know that some people are fascinated by what I did 40 years ago as a teenage boy, but I've always looked on it as something that was immoral, illegal, unethical and a life, and will to my death," he said.

What people don't realize is that the period was an extremely difficult one for him that was launched when his parents were divorced when he was 16.

"With most divorces, the children are the first to know," Abagnale said. "My parents were very good about keeping it a secret."

So good, in fact, that Abagnale didn't know it was going to happen until one day when he was taken out of class, brought to the courthouse and asked by a judge which parent he wanted to live with.

"I started to cry, and I turned and ran out of the courtroom," he said. "My mother never saw me again for about seven years,

until I was a young adult.

"Contrary to the movie, my father never saw me nor spoke to me again," he said.

Abagnale eventually was arrested at the age of 21 by French police, who put him in prison — an experience Spielberg reconstructed for the movie by poring over the institution's log books.

"He said there was a blanket on the floor, a hole in the floor to go to the bathroom, no plumbing, no electricity," Abagnale said. "He said the log books show that I entered the prison at 198 pounds, and left the prison at 109 pounds.

Even more painfully for Abagnale, his father died during his incarceration.

After his release, he was imprisoned by Swedish authorities, and then by the U.S.

Four years into a 12-year sentence he was approached by the FBI to work against fraud, and he's been doing so ever since.

"I was very fortunate because I grew up in a great country where everybody gets a second chance," he said. "I owe my country 800 times more than I could ever repay for the opportunity it's given me for the past 36 years.

One idea Abagnale shuns is that his story is a glamorous one.

"How could I tell you my life was glamorous when I cried myself to sleep until I was 19 years old?" he said "I spent every birthday, Christmas, Mothers' Day in a hotel room somewhere in the world by myself.

Beyond his work for the FBI, Abagnale said it has been his wife and three sons who have turned his life around.

'Steven Spielberg made a wonderful film, but I've had nothing more rewarding, nothing more worthwhile, nothing that's brought me more peace, more enjoyment, more calm in my life, than a sense of being a good husband and a good father," he said.
