#### **3 Arrested For Valley Springs Meth Lab Fire**

VALLEY SPRINGS (AP) — Minnehaha County authorities say a garage in Valley Springs that burned was a methamphetamine lab, and three people have been arrested.

No one was hurt in the Friday blaze that heavily damaged the garage and sent smoke into the attached living quarters.

The two men and one woman who lived there have been arrested on several drug-related charges. The Argus Leader reports that bond for the two men, 26-year-old Reynaldo Ortega and 24-year-old Joseph Reinke, was set at \$25,000 cash.

A 26-year-old woman was released without bond under the condition she submit to weekly drug testing because police believe she did not have a role in cooking the meth.

#### S.D. Sees Weekend Rains After Dry March

RAPID CITY (AP) - South Dakota is welcoming some muchneeded moisture.

The National Weather Service says rain fell throughout the state over the weekend after a record-breaking dry March. Some areas got 1 1/2 inches or more.

Rapid City Fire Department Lt. Brent Long tells KEVN-TV that the moisture will help slow the spread of any Black Hills wildfires.

The weather in eastern South Dakota on Sunday included thunderstorms that brought rain and hail and also spawned funnel clouds. Some of them reportedly touched down but there were no immediate reports of damage. KELO-TV reports winds uprooted a tree and sent it crashing into a house in Sioux Falls, but no one was

KGFX radio reports that Pierre, Aberdeen, Watertown and Sisseton all set rainfall records for the date on Sunday.

#### **Omaha Man Sentenced For Letting Mom Starve**

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) - An Omaha man who let his 66-year-old mother starve to death has been given 21 to 66 months in prison.

Forty-four-year-old Robert Rogers had pleaded guilty to manslaughter after prosecutors agreed to drop a felony charge of abuse of a vulnerable adult. Omaha television station KETV says Rogers was sentenced on Monday. Connie Rogers was found dead in her home last May. Her son,

who was her primary caregiver, was charged in July.

Prosecutors believe Connie Rogers died in her feces-ridden bed and was dressed in clean clothes and moved to a couch in the living room. She weighed 70 pounds.

#### S.F. Man Gets Prison For Firearms Offense

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — A Sioux Falls man has been sentenced to more than six years in prison for owning a firearm while a convicted felon.

U.S. Attorney Brendan Johnson says 31-year-old Marckus Ray Drake pleaded guilty in January to possessing a 9 mm pistol after earlier being convicted of a felony.

District Judge Karen E. Schreier sentenced Drake to six years and three months in prison, to be followed by three years of supervised release.

#### Judge Orders R.C. Woman To Avoid Minors

RAPID CITY (AP) — A Rapid City woman accused of having sex with a 14-year-old boy and possessing child pornography has been ordered to stay away from minors and alcohol.

Twenty-eight-year-old April Solles has been charged with rape and sexual contact with a child under 16.

She also faces two counts of possessing, manufacturing and distributing child porn.

KOTĂ reports that a judge banned Solles from contacting minors — with the exception of her son — at a hearing Monday.

Authorities say the complicated case began unfolding late last year after Solles' 1-year-old girl died from a head injury. A 14-yearold boy is charged in juvenile court with second-degree murder in the death. Prosecutors haven't said if he is the same boy connected with the rape case.



# South Dakota Warm Weather Boosts Fishing Licenses

#### Sales Numbers Show A Big Increase

SIOUX FALLS — The South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks Department has sold more than twice as many annual resident fishing licenses than it did at this point last year thanks to an un-seasonably warm spring.

The department had issued 18.917 annual resident licenses as of March 27, outpacing the 7,867 sold by that date in 2011 by more than 140 percent.

GF&P spokesman Chuck Schlueter said many people have been buying early to take advan-tage of the good fishing now, but officials hope the strong sales continue through summer.
