junior year at the University of South Dakota in Vermillion.

"As lieutenant governor, I travel a lot. I go to Pierre on Monday morning, and I get back to Yankton on Thursday night or Friday," Matt Michels said.

"Karen and I are apart a lot, my mother lives in Vermillion, and I have a lot of friends who are here (in the Yankton-Vermillion area). I felt this would be the best solution for us."

Lt. Gov. Michels said he will resume more of a daily practice at his Yankton law office, including his work with the Avera health system.

Michels also wants to cut down on his drive time around the state. The extensive travel has aggravated back problems dating back to his work during last year's historic Missouri River flooding.

"Thankfully, it's not a disc, but a lot of it is muscle issues that I have been fighting since the flood," he said. "Traveling in the car a great deal increases the pain. And at home, I can exercise more."

Under the state constitution, the lieutenant governor serves as president of the Senate and is first in the line of succession to the governorship. The constitution also allows the governor to assign additional duties to the lieutenant governor.

Over the past year, Michels has overseen the Department of the Military, the Bureau of Personnel and the Department of Tribal Affairs. He has also led the state's efforts relating to federal health care reform.

Michels helped to lead the flood response in Union County last spring. He also monitored the flood situation in Yankton County and other downstream areas.

Michels currently serves as the interim Secretary of Veterans' Affairs, a role he will continue until early next year.

Michels told the Press & Dakotan he will remain active in legislative and budgetary issues but do more work out of Yankton. He plans to meet with Daugaard on a regular basis and spend time each month in Pierre.

In his role as lieutenant governor, Michels said he will continue working with mental health issues, including areas related to the Human Services Center (HSC) in Yankton; and on international trade issues.

Michels said he will also work with Major Gen. Tim Reisch, adjutant general of the South Dakota National Guard, on military-related issues. Those areas include the downsizing of the Guard and closure of armories, deployments and the return of units from missions, the Veterans Affairs (VA) hospital in Hot Springs and a possible VA hospital in eastern South Dakota with Yankton as a potential site.

While not working with health care reform for the state on a daily basis, Michels anticipates playing an active role when the U.S. Supreme Court hands down its decision on the reform legislation.

"We (of the Daugaard administration) will all be in the room, talking about the impact on South Dakota and the projects we are working on," the lieutenant governor said.

Michels will also continue serving on the executive committee of the National Lieutenant Governors' Association. He cited those relationships as playing an important role in defending the safety of lean, finely-textured beef, including the recent tour and press conference at the BPI plant in South Sioux City, Neb.

Michels said he looks forward to his new role.

"This is a perfect blend," he said. "I am really grateful to the governor, that I can spend more time with my family and in the community while continuing to do the (governmental) things I love."
