Woman Dies After Stabbing At Walmart

RAPID CITY (AP) — A woman has died after being stabbed in the parking lot of a Rapid City Walmart.

Rapid City police say they were called to the Walmart at about 3:20 p.m. for a report of a stabbing. A 30-year-old woman was found with multiple stab wounds in the parking lot. She was transported to a local hospital, where she was pronounced dead. Her name has not been released.

The suspect was found barricaded in a bathroom at a nearby hotel with self-inflicted stab wounds. He was transported to a hospital and detained by law enforcement. His condition is unknown.

KOTA-TV reports that the woman was a Walmart employee. Rapid City police spokeswoman Tarah Heupel says she does not know if the two people knew each other.

Woman Denies Charge For Having Child Drive

NORFOLK, Neb. (AP) — A 32-year-old woman accused of using her 11-year-old daughter to drive the mom and two friends during a night of drinking has pleaded not guilty to child abuse.

The Norfolk Daily News reports that Jennifer Etgen, of Tilden, is out of jail on bond and is scheduled for trial on June 12.

Norfolk police say an officer saw a pickup driven by the girl almost hit a curb just before 3:15 a.m. on March 13.

After pulling over the truck, the officer was told the girl was driving because her mom and two friends had been drinking

The felony charge of child abuse carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison.

Mom Convicted Of Helping Sons Sell Marijuana

MITCHELL (AP) - A Mitchell woman has been found guilty of helping her 17- and 19-year-old sons sell marijuana.

À jury convicted Charlene Stahl, 43, Tuesday after a two-day trial, The Daily Republic reported. She will be sentenced later on charges of aiding and abetting a drug crime and contributing to the abuse, neglect or delinquency of a child. Jurors found her not guilty of actually possessing marijuana.

Assistant Attorney General Katie Mallery asked jurors to find Stahl guilty on all three counts.

'She knows what is going on, she's promoting it and she's facilitating it," the prosecutor said.

Defense attorney Mike Fink acknowledged prosecutors proved Stahl contributed to the delinquency of a minor by giving her 17year-old son cigarettes, but he maintained that prosecutors lacked evidence for the aiding and abetting charge.

Grain Elevator Fire Prompts Home Evacuations

MILLER (AP) — An overnight grain elevator fire in the eastern South Dakota city of Miller prompted officials to temporarily close off roads and evacuate about 15 homes.

An employee at a nearby business reported the fire at Miller Grain about 11 p.m. Wednesday. Homes downwind from the scene were evacuated as a precaution about 1:30 a.m. because of concerns about strong winds and embers and also possible toxic fumes from rodent control chemicals inside the facility, authorities said. The 40-50 residents were allowed to return home about 3:30

The fire was under control as of 8 a.m. but an estimated 2 million pounds of sunflowers destined to become bird seed still were

Feds Move Closer To First Tribal National Park

SIOUX FALLS — As the National Park Service and Department of Interior move closer to creating the nation's first national park managed by an American Indian tribe, new details about what the park could look like are being released, including plans to establish a freeroaming bison herd.

The National Park Service and the Interior Department on Thursday released the final version of a plan that would establish the first national tribal park at the South Unit of Badlands National Park, which is entirely within the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota. Congress must still approve the establishment of the park, but Thursday's announcement means the National Park Service and the Oglala Sioux tribe can begin implementing parts of the plan and identifying what a tribal national park looks like.

'As we seek to tell a more inclusive story of America, a tribal national park would help celebrate and honor the history and culture of the Oglala Sioux people," Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar said in a statement.

The U.S. government's War Department took what is now the South Unit from the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation to establish a practice bombing range in the 1940s. It was

returned to the Oglala Sioux tribe in 1976 and has since been co-managed with the Park Service. The tribe began pushing for greater control of the unit's 133,300 acres about a decade ago, after they disagreed with the Park Service's plans for the land.

The plan released Thursday recommends Congress create a new designation for a tribal national park. Depending on Congressional action, it could be administered several different ways, including as a unit of NPS managed by tribal members who work as NPS employees or by tribal members who work for the tribe.

Eric Brunnemann, superintendent of the Badlands National Park, said one goal is to create a free-roaming, economically viable herd of bison at the park as part of the Park Service's plan to establish and sustain at least three wild bison herds in the central and western United States over the next 100

"We have tried for many years to put buffalo into the South Unit, but because the parcels are so small, you can't really succeed," Brunnemann said.

He said officials are working with non-governmental organizations to test and study the viability of piecing together parcels to allow for a free-roaming herd in the area and working with donors for funding.

"No one wants to go down the path of a good idea if it's going to unravel," he said. We need to have the science and the eco-

nomics at the table, hand in hand." The plan calls for the Park Service and Oglala Sioux tribe to enhance the wildlife

habitat and improve roads and trails for visi-

At least 95 percent of the facilities for visitor use and park management are located in the North Unit, which is connected to Interstate 90 and draws more than 900.000 visitors annually. The South Unit draws around 9,500 visitors, according to the National Park Service.

Oglala Sioux tribal president John Yellow Bird Steele has said he looks forward to the park adding one thing much sought after among reservation residents: jobs.

"For a few of our people, it would be creating careers in archaeology, anthropology, paleontology," he said.

The tribe recently hired Gerard Baker, the former superintendent of Mount Rushmore National Memorial, as executive director of the Oglala Sioux Parks and Recreation Authority. He has created a new Department of Tourism within the organization and said he has many plans for increasing visitors to the South Unit, including with guided tours, more events and extended hours.

Appeals Court Judge Appointed To State High Court

LINCOLN, Neb. — A Nebraska Court of Appeals judge has been chosen to fill a vacancy on the state's highest court, Gov. Dave Heineman announced Thursday.

Heineman said he has chosen William Cassel, of O'Neill, to join the Nebraska Supreme Court. He replaces Judge John Gerrard, who left the Supreme Court for an appointment as a U.S. District Court

Cassel, who is eligible to join the bench immediately because he already is a judge, said in a statement that he was "deeply honored" by the governor's trust and confidence and would strive to serve Nebraska residents as a member of the state's highest

Cassel has served on the appeals court since 2003, participating in roughly 5,000 cases and writing 650 opinions. He spent 12 years as a district court judge, and worked as a private-practice attorney in Ainsworth from 1979 to

The judge has volunteered at the University of Nebraska's Law College, helping teach students about ethics and professionalism. He has been a guest speaker in multiple classes and served as a

judge for the students' final trial before a mock jury.

"He's always been just a wonderful help to us and our programs," said Associate Dean Glenda Pierce, who teaches one of the classes where he has volunteered. "He always gave good, constructive comments that were delivered in a kind way.'

Cassel also has served for five years as a "master of the bench" for the Robert Van Pelt American Inn of Court, an educational organization focused on developing high standards of ethics and professionalism for law students and lawyers.

He was a co-recipient of the 2011 Nebraska Supreme Court

award for "Distinguished Judge for Improvement of the Judiciary" and has been elected as a fellow of both the Nebraska State Bar Foundation and the American Bar Foundation

Cassel will serve as the justice from the Nebraska Supreme Court's third district, a region in the northeast part of the state that includes 19 counties and parts of Douglas and Sarpy counties around Omaha.

He was one of three nominees chosen last month by a state judicial nominating commission. The others were Omaha attorney Francie Riedmann, and Sixth District Judge John Samson of Blair.
