S.D. Leaders To Discuss Federal Farm Bill At Forum

SIOUX FALLS - South Dakota's conservation and agricultural leaders will join together here on May 2 to discuss how the 2012 U.S. Farm Bill can better conserve the state's land, water and rural communities.

Sponsored by the Izaak Walton League of America, the May 2 forum is scheduled from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. at the Sioux Falls Chapter of the Izaak Walton League, located at 5000 North Oakview Place, Sioux Falls.

Addressing the group in the morning will be South Dakota Secretary of Agriculture Walt Bones and representatives from the South Dakota Congressional Delegation.

The afternoon will feature a panel discussion by South Dakota farmers and comments by representatives of the South Dakota Corn Growers Association, South Dakota Farm Bureau, South Dakota Farmers Union, South Dakota Grasslands Coalition, and Dakota Rural Action.

"Every five years, a massive piece of legislation called the Farm Bill determines how tens of billions of federal tax dollars will be spent to shape American agriculture. These sessions will help all South Dakotans — from farmers to grocery shoppers - better

conservation, nutrition, and rural development. The last bill, passed in 2008, was called the Food. Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 and carried a price tag of \$288 billion. Under current requirements for federal deficit reduction, funding for the Farm Bill will be under increased scrutiny, which underscores the importance of public involvement, Redlin explained.

One way the IWLA is exploring to increase conservation and save federal tax dollars in the 2012 Farm Bill is to prioritize stewardship agreements that will protect wetlands, wildlife habitat and sensitive soils.

"Under specific provisions in federal farm law, farmers who accept taxpayers' money agree to provide basic stewardship of soil, water and wetlands," Redlin said. "This requires no additional federal dollars; in fact, it can result in budgetary savings, cleaner water and improved wildlife habit."
