Reservation, Abuse Focus Of 2-Part Documentary

SIOUX FALLS - Robin Poor Bear was reluctant to speak out about the sexual abuse she said she experienced as a child living

with an adoptive family. But ultimately Poor Bear, a member of the Oglala Sioux Tribe who lives on the Spirit Lake Nation in North Dakota, decided to share her story in a two-part PBS documentary, "Kind Hearted Woman," in hopes of helping other abuse survivors.

The documentary, from filmmaker David Sutherland, airs Monday and Tuesday.

"It affected my personal relationship. It affected my decision making. It affected my parenting. It affected everything," Poor Bear said of the abuse she described at the hands of her adoptive family.

"Kind Hearted Woman" follows the 32year-old woman as she attempts to earn a degree in social work, find a new man to love, navigate the tribal court system and overcome her addiction to alcohol.

Poor Bear's story is not uncommon. Native American women suffer incidents of domestic violence at rates more than double national averages, according to the Department of Justice. And the Spirit Lake Tribe was accused last year of failing to protect vulnerable children from sexual abuse. The Bureau of Indian Affairs took over control of the child protection services in October.

Poor Bear worried that she would lose her adopted family if she spoke out about the abuse — but the heartache was worth it, she said.

"Whatever I go through in this film — the good, the bad, the in-between — it's all worth it if it helped one person," she said. "It's a lonely path when you don't have anybody asking, 'How are things going?' and truly mean it."

Over time, Sutherland became a friend, she added. "He was the person who honestly cared, truly cared," she said.

Sutherland, whose previous film credits include "The Farmer's Wife" and "Country Boys," said he initially did not want to feature Poor Bear in the film.

"She was crying. She was a wreck, and I thought she was too passive," he said.

But he stayed in touch with her and eventually decided to follow Poor Bear and her two children.

"My goal is that you care about her," he

Black Hills' Elk Population Increases In 2012

RAPID CITY (AP) — The state Game, Fish & Parks Department is increasing its population estimate for elk in the Black Hills.

The Rapid City Journal reports that a recently completed helicopter survey of South Dakota's portion of the Black Hills showed an estimate of slightly more than 6,000 elk. This is up from an estimate of 4,000 a year ago.

GF&P regional wildlife manager John Kanta says the survey included aerial work and is more comprehensive than previous surveys. He says that is why the estimate went up.

But other people aren't so sure. John Wrede is a retired GF&P conservation officer and regional wildlife manager. Wrede believes the survey counted some elk more than once, which is leading to inaccurate estimates.

Repairs Completed On **Gavins Point Dam**

PIERRE — When Morris Inc. decided to bid on a series of dam repair projects along the Missouri River, the company certainly didn't expect its work at Gavins Point Dam to include dealing with a 1,000-pound ball of fishing line and car-sized slabs of falling ice.

That's just a glimpse of the obstacles Morris Inc. and its subcontractors faced during the winter months in Yankton.

Morris Inc. project manager Dennis Rounds is overseeing six repair projects at Big Bend, Fort Randall and Gavins Point. The projects were awarded to the company by a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Multiple Award Task Order Contract.

Rounds said the recent work completed on the concrete slab below the Gavins Point Dam spillway was the most demanding and satisfying by far.

"A lot of the projects they have us working on are due to damage from the flood two years ago," Rounds told the Capital Journal newspaper. "We were hired to repair the damaged concrete, and in some cases go in and repair drain tiles underneath the slab."

The Gavins Point slab was damaged when record amounts of water were released from the spillway during the 2011 flood. The project, which began in late November, had three objectives — make repairs to the concrete slab and the gravel frost blanket, conduct additional assessments on the spillway and remove debris that was deposited on the

The tasks were completed in two phases — underwater debris removal and concrete repairs above water. For the first phase, Morris Inc. hired professional dive company Veolia Environmental Services.

"We knew it would have to be done over the winter because the work is below the emergenacy spillway gates, and the only time those gates would be closed would be after Thanksgiving until

the end of March," Rounds said. "So any contractual schedule we had for doing the work really became a moot point."

Morris Inc. provided the barge system for the divers, who worked 13-hour days alongside the Morris workforce installing grates and borings and excavating debris all winter long.

The team of divers dredged up large boulders, broken concrete and sediment, but more surprising debris came in the form of a thousand arrows, a 1,000-pound ball of tangled fishing line and a 1969 class ring. With the ring's initials and an old yearbook, the divers found a potential owner, but Rounds said no one has come forward to claim it so far.

"These dams are living, breathing structures," he said. "There's a lot more than what we see.

Phase two involved repairing the 81 relief wells along the dam's base and installing 41 borings to collect data on the damage and efficiency of the dam. The Corps asked for 15 of those borings to include permanent water pressure and temperature sensors connected with fiber optic cables.

Complications with the work included time delays caused by constant ice and flooding. A fulltime ice removal crew used a heated pressure sprayer to dislodge large chunks of overhanging ice on the leaking gates.

The divers wrapped up last week with a final inspection by Morris Inc. Waters rose on March 18, sealing the company's labor. Rounds said working on such a concrete deadline motivated each team member to finish the

"The water was going to rise whether we were done or not, so we had to be out of there because the concrete would be flooded," he said. "This is really specialized work. It's a new area for Morris Inc. to get into - contracting, subcontracting and management. We've certainly learned a lot."
