UConn Women Make Record Sixth Straight Final Four

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — Connecticut is headed back to a familiar place — the Final Four.
Breanna Stewart scored 21 points and Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis added 17 to help top-seed UConn rout Kentucky 83-53 on Monday night and advance to a record sixth-straight national semifinal.
The Huskies will face either Notre Dame or Duke in the national semifinals on Sunday in New Orleans. The Irish and Blue Devils play Tuesday night. UConn (33-4) broke a tie with Stanford (2008-12), LSU (2004-08) and itself (2000-04) by reaching the Final Four again.
It was the second straight season that UConn beat Kentucky in the regional finals. The Huskies topped the Wildcats by 15 last year 105 miles to the north of Bridgeport in Kingston, R.I.
This game wasn't as close. Kentucky stayed close for the first 10 minutes with their "40 minutes of dread" defense. Then UConn turned up its own defensive intensity.
The Huskies trailed 23-22 with just 9 minutes left in the first half. That's when Stewart — honored as the outstanding player of the Bridgeport Regional — and UConn's "no-name" defense took over allowing three points the rest of the half. Kentucky missed 13 of its final 14 shots in the half with the only make coming when Jelleah Sidney banked in a 3-pointer from the wing.

ers at the press conference, the nurses and doctors told me that was the first time he broke down and cried, when the players were talking about him."
Those of us old enough to witness Theismann's injury remember that it wasn't until Giants line-backer Lawrence Taylor panicked that anyone — ABC's production and broadcast crews included — had any idea how bad the Redskins' quarterback had been hurt. ABC quickly put up replays, seem-

ingly more impressed by its ability to show a reverse-angle of the hit than by the damage it caused.
It wasn't until it came back from a commercial break and was about to show the replay a third time, that the network warned viewers of the graphic nature of the video. The way the various depictions of Ware's injury quickly bounced around the globe may have left some wishing that even that simple warning was attached beforehand.
"We've become an 'I-want-to-know-it-now' culture," Theismann said. "But for all the attention at the moment, it's his emotions that Kevin will have to deal with at some point, and mostly on his own. That's where his teammates will come in. There will be plenty

people offering help, but if you've ever competed at any level, you know you wind up playing and trying to win for somebody."
"His teammates showed that by the way they finished the Duke game. It's the guys you laugh and sweat and bleed and cry alongside that will give him the encouragement to fight back. Just before I got off the phone, I told him, 'A year from now, you'll be the comeback player of the year,' and he said, 'I'm going to work for it.' I told him I'd be watching."
He won't be the only one.

national wrestling federation with lots of pressure and get the backing from many countries to take the back seat in apply pressure also. (USA, Iran, Turkey, Egypt, Japan, China, Poland, Sweden, Cuba, Hungary, South Korea and many more countries.
We will now have the next 7 months to convince the IOC that wrestling needs to stay as an Olympic sport in May 2013 when the IOC's executive board is to meet and review its recommendations, or in September, when the entire IOC congress meets to ratify the decision.
Vladimir Putin, a black-belt in Sombro (a Russian martial art that includes wrestling) who just happens to be the president of Russia, and the nation's most powerful political figure. So, Putin of Russia maybe will be the key figure in the IOC's decision. Putin is a very macho guy who loves combat sports, reportedly was shocked by the IOC's decision to remove wrestling from the core sports program.

winner (1-0) threw 91 pitches, giving up three hits and two walks.
In conditions that favored the men on the mound over the players at the plate, Verlander struck out Twins rookie Aaron Hicks in each of the center fielder's first three at-bats. Skipping Triple-A to face a pitcher like Verlander is a tough transition, even for the 14th overall pick from the 2008 draft. Hicks said he went through six hand-warmers during the game.
Hicks is one of a handful of enticing prospects the Twins are counting on for a turnaround from 96 and 99 losses the last two seasons. Most of the rest of them are pitchers still in the minors, with the Twins trying to revamp a rota-

tion that had the third-worst ERA in the majors last year.
Worley (0-1) worked sleeveless - always his preference, because he sweats a lot - for his Twins debut and first AL appearance, completing six innings with eight hits, three runs and one walk. He struck out three and stayed poised after falling behind 3-0.
"It would've been nice to have that the first couple innings, but it was just a matter of getting comfortable out there," said Worley, who threw 101 pitches.
The right-hander, acquired in the trade that sent speedy outfielder Ben Revere to Philadelphia, gave up a bouncing single to Torii Hunter on a hit-and-run in the first inning followed by another groundball that sneaked down the line for the RBI double by Fielder.
"He had some things go wrong, but he kept going out there and battling and gave us a good chance to win," Mauer said.

Putting Mauer in the No. 2 spot in the batting order is what Gardenhire believes will give the Twins the best chance to win, an "ambush" style of offense, as the manager put it before the game. Mauer and Morneau are the only two players who were also in the opening day lineup in 2011.
"We need people to get on in front of 'em, but that's the way we're going to roll," Gardenhire said.

Oladipo got 58 first-team votes and 306 points. McDermott had 44 first-team votes and 279 points, one more than Olynyk's total points. The Gonzaga junior got 47 first-team votes.
Burke, a 6-0 sophomore point guard, had an impressive individual season while running a team that at times had four freshmen on the court with him.
"That's like a quarterback that's got his offensive tackle's a freshman, his wide receiver is a freshman, and his running back is a freshman, and he still leads them to wins," said Wolverines coach John Beilein, using an analogy from the sport his school loves. "So he's taken a lot on as far as leadership. Quiet leadership now, but it's been huge for us."
Burke averaged 19.2 points, 3.1 rebounds and 6.7 assists and shot 40.1 percent on 3-point attempts. He is Michigan's fifth All-America and first since Chris Webber in 1993.
"Every now and then you think about individual accolades, and that was definitely a goal of mine coming into my freshman year," Burke said. "I didn't know it would be this quick, but it happens."
Porter, a 6-8 sophomore, is a smooth, solid forward whose coach describes his efforts this way: "Otto was Otto."
"I've defined it all year — probably without saying it — in that he

is a selfless player, in that all of his actions, all of his thoughts are on how can he help our team win," Hoyas coach John Thompson III said. "And because he's so talented, with such God-given ability, because he is the worker that he is, because he is as coachable as he is, he has been able to succeed on many different fronts. Not just scoring. I don't want to say he's a complete basketball player — he's not finished — but he excels at many different aspects of the game, many of which show up in the stat sheet, many of which don't."
What does show up on Porter's stat line is 16.3 points and 7.4 rebounds per game while shooting 42.7 percent from behind the 3-point line. He is Georgetown's sixth All-America and first since Allen Iverson in 1996.
Oladipo is Indiana's first All-America since A.J. Guyton in 2000 and the eighth overall. He was impressed to be joining the likes of Scott May, Kent Benson, Isaiah Thomas, Steve Alford and Calbert Cheaney.
"I'm kind of speechless to be with the great names in college basketball, the NBA, in basketball history," Oladipo, a 6-5 junior swingman, said. "To be put in a sentence with them only makes me want to work harder."
That is one of the traits Hoosiers coach Tom Crean loves about Oladipo, who averaged 13.6 points, 6.4 rebounds and 2.2 steals while shooting 59.9 percent from the field and 44.3 percent on 3s.
"I see somebody who continues to get better every step of the way at Indiana," Crean said. "I think

puts in that kind of time and that kind of work and cares about his teammates, all the outside stuff doesn't matter. It's on the court that does."
Olynyk, a native of Canada, became an All-America with a junior season that saw the Bulldogs reach No. 1 for the first time in school history. The 7-footer averaged 17.5 points and 7.2 rebounds while shooting 65.2 percent from the field. He was recognized as much this for his long hair as his inside game.
"Obviously you believe in yourself, but I didn't expect it to explode on the scene with this much attention," said Olynyk, who red-shirted last season. "My teammates and coaches believed in me and put me in a position to succeed."
Olynyk joins Dan Dickau and Adam Morrison as Gonzaga All-Americans.
Freshman guard Marcus Smart of Oklahoma State got 11 first-team votes and 190 points and was joined on the second team by senior Mason Plumlee of Duke, sophomores Cody Zeller of Indiana and Shane Larkin of Miami and freshman Ben McLemore of Kansas.
The third team was seniors Jeff Withey of Kansas, Erick Green of Virginia Tech and Walters and juniors DeShaun Thomas of Ohio State and Russ Smith of Louisville.
