

December that listed its tax receivables for 2013. Such a letter is not required, but Skinner encourages auditors to send one out to each tax entity in the county so they can make sure the levy matches expectations. That letter didn't arrive until shortly before the township's March meeting — much too late to correct the situation for 2013. "We're not here to point fingers or put blame on anybody," Cap said. "We just want you to possibly make a change in the Auditor's Office and recognize Colleen's recommendation that, in the future, a letter be sent out with the respective tax entities' receivables on there for the following year so any changes can be made." Commissioners agreed it was a good idea, but said they have no ability to make sure such a procedure is put in place. "We can recommend it just like Colleen recommends it, but the auditor runs her office the way she sees fit, and there is not a lot we can do about it," Commissioner Donna Freng said. "If it's not required by the state, it can't be required by us." In Volin Township's case, a \$10,000 annual opt-out for 10 years was approved in 2011 and was to take effect in 2012. Ray Epp, chairman of the township board, said there is currently \$31,000 in the bank, and road maintenance has been approximately \$18,000 during each of the last three years. "That leaves us \$12,000 to play chicken with, and it's not good," Epp stated. "We really need that \$10,000. I don't know what else I can tell you." Moore said that Legislative Audit is expected to report back on the issue during the next County Commission meeting. He advised the Utica and Volin township representatives that state auditors may seek to do interviews with them

during the next two weeks. Commission Chairman Bruce Jensen asked Moore whether Legislative Audit had indicated if the county could be required to pay the townships the funds if it is found that a mistake was made in the county Auditor's Office. "If the levy was not put in place, the answer is no, we don't have to," Moore responded. "But in visiting with Russ, you could go ahead if you have the money and pay forward on this." He recommended that the commission allow Legislative Audit and the Department of Revenue to finish their investigation before making any decisions, and the remaining commissioners agreed. Commissioner Allen Sinclair was absent from Tuesday's meeting. The commissioners assured the townships they will do everything they can to help. "Our intention is not to leave you guys hanging out there like this," Freng said. "We know that mistakes were made and things weren't done in a timely fashion. If there is anything we can do, we're

going to do our best. But we have to wait for the folks in Pierre help us find this perfect path to try to help you out." In other business Tuesday, the commission: • agreed to share costs with Hutchinson County for a culvert; • gave permission to the Highway Department and the Weed Department to share the cost of purchasing a water storage tank; • approved an ordinance allowing the commission to hire personnel in situations such as the current one where the auditor is on medical leave; • hired an employee that will be shared by the Highway Department and the Planning and Zoning Office; and • gave permission for the River-rat Marathon and Bike Ride to use the Deer Boulevard recreational trail April 27 as long as it isn't under construction.

This year, four times the poverty level is about \$62,000 for a two-person family. For a family of four, it's \$94,200.
