Pierre Duo Lead Class AA All-State Team

PIERRE — After leading the Pierre Governors to their first title in 31 years, Lane Severyn and Zach Hanson headline this season's Class AA All-

The Pierre duo is joined by Brandon Valley's Chase Marso, Watertown's Tanner Heiser, Sioux Falls Roosevelt's Tyler Howard and Brookings' Tyler Nagy on the first team, as voted by the South Dakota Coaches Association and the South Dakota Sportswriters Association. Heiser, Severyn and Hanson are the only players on the team with previous All-State

Hanson and Severyn capped off their careers with All-State selections after seasons that saw Severyn top the Governors' all-time lists for scoring (1,486 points) and rebounds (658) with Hanson a close second in both categories (1,362 points and 654 re-

of the program for four years at the varsity level and it will definitely be different without them next year," Governors coach Terry Becker said. "They've set a new standard with all they have done. It's been tremendous to see them do this together, they've been a phenomenal duo and I think

that was evident in the state tournament. Each of them found their moments to step up throughout the three games and it's just a testament to their hard work and the talent that they possess.

Severyn and Hanson also made their mark in the Class AA record books. With Severyn ranking fifth all time in scoring and Hanson following in eighth, the two were the only teammates in the top-10 together on the who's who of Class AA legends.

"It's going to be great to look back on what Lane and I did together," Hanson said. "The success that the team had over the past four years has been better, though. We couldn't have done other guys with us."

Hanson, who will be a member of the Creighton Bluejays next year, averaged 20 points and 8.6 rebounds a contest. The 6-foot-9 big man also stepped up at the state tournament with five points in the final 30 seconds in Pierre's semi-final comeback against Sioux Falls Lincoln, and he also grabbed 13 rebounds and had five blocks in the championship round.

It led to Hanson earning his second consecutive first-team selection to go along with his second-team nod in 2011 to cap a historic career.

"It's a great to be mentioned with all of the great players in the state,' Hanson, who also won the state's Gatorade Player of the Year for the second consecutive year, said. "All of these accolades at the end of the year have been exciting. It's nice to enjoy it now that it's all over.'

Northwestern Tops Mount Marty 7-2 In First Home Match In Program History

As if the Mount Marty College women's tennis record books weren't already new enough, Vanessa Rockne gave the first-year program a rather significant early achievement.

She handed the reigning conference player of the year a rare loss.

Although Northwestern beat the Lancers 7-2 in Mount Marty's first-ever home tennis match on Thursday in Great Plains Athletic Conference (GPAC) action in Yankton, the hometown squad was treated to a thrilling flight one singles match.

Rockne, a freshman from Yankton, upset last year's GPAC Player of the Year Frankie Eszes 7-5, 6-3 — the firstever conference loss for Eszes, a

The Morningside coach told me that (Wednesday) I would be playing the best girl in the conference, Rockne said later. "And I thought, 'Uh oh.' But I looked it as a challenge.'

For a program that was added in November 2011, naturally there was

some anticipation for its first home match — and the challenge of facing one of the league's top teams. Was it

nice to finally play?
"Gosh yes," Rockne said with a smile. "We've been practicing since January, and I kept thinking, 'Just get me on the court.

Once they did, the young Lancers (0-3) — comprised of seven freshmen held their own with the best Northwestern had to offer. Beyond simply the results, MMC was glad to finally have a product to showcase for local fans, according to coach Rob Klim-

"I think the girls had a lot of fun, and I know it was fun for all of us to be out here," Klimisch said. "Hopefully we started a tradition here.'

Part of that tradition, team members said, is to continue working toward being a potential contender in

"There's always room for improve-ment, all around," said Kendra Cersosimo, who scored Mount Marty's only other win Thursday. The Mitchell native beat Terry Odera 6-1, 6-1 at

Dropping their singles matches for the Lancers were Yankton native Danielle Gill (flight 3), Lauren Janssen (4), Becky Koch (5) and Michaela Ramm (6). Lexie Klimisch of Yankton did not compete for a second straight match.

Of course, with a first-year program comes the opportunity to start fresh, Cersosimo said.

"I like the idea of being on a new team, with all new players," she said. "There's no pressure and no expectations; everything's new. You get a chance to start something together."

There was a sense of being together at the Yankton High School/Summit Activities Center Courts on Thursday, as the Lancers were greeted by a good-sized crowd.

"When you looked around, you saw family and friends, but we even had Mount Marty students and staff, said coach Klimisch, who also mentioned "tennis fans" Ron Kachena and Tim Mulhair as being in attendance.

The support for the Lancers is already being felt across the GPAC,

'We actually had a better turnout at Morningside than they did, which is really saying something for tennis," he

Such a fanbase can also make a player nervous, Rockne said with a smile.

"There's an upside and a downside, I think," she said. "I don't really like a lot of people watching me, but it was cool to see familiar faces.

Mount Marty returns to action April 13 at Doane in Fremont, Neb., followed by an April 19 home match with Hastings. The Lancers close the regular season April 27 at Nebraska

Detroit K Hanson Retiring

DETROIT (AP) — Jason Hanson wanted to keep on kicking. His body told him to stop.

The Detroit Lions kicker is retiring after 21 seasons, announcing his decision Thursday. The 42-year-old Hanson thought about returning, but problems with his heel prompted him to call it a career.

"It's time," Hanson said. "I gave serious thought and consideration to playing in 2013. While the determination and willpower are still there, the wear and tear on my body, especially the issues I had and still have with my heel, have convinced me that it's time to retire."

Hanson became the first player to play 300 games with one franchise, finishing with 327. He also set an NFL record last year when he played his 21st season with the same team.

Hanson made a record 52 field goals from at least 50 yards. He's third on the career scoring list at 2,150 points and third in field goals with 495. Hanson is the only player with 2,000 points for one franchise.

"Jason Hanson is the gold standard," Lions President Tom Lewand said. "He had an exemplary, Hall-of-Fame worthy career on the field, and for those of us fortunate to know him well, he is an even better person, teammate, friend, husband and father."

Hanson joined such players as Jerry Rice, George Blanda, Morten Andersen, Gary Anderson and Vinny Testaverde with 21 pro seasons.
