Weather Continues To Frustrate Fernandez, Other Area Coaches

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Like most coaches this spring, Mount Marty College softball coach Albert Fernandez has been feeling the effects of the return to a "normal" South Dakota spring. One where we're talking about a chance of snow on April 10, rather than temps in the 90s, as in 2012.

If the Lancers are able to reschedule today's (Wednesday) doubleheader with Presentation College, it will mean Fernandez's team will play 24 games — 12 doubleheaders — between this Friday and the end of the regular season, April 28.

"We're going to have at least three doubleheaders a week for the next three or four weeks," he said. "We have a lot of games to get in."

Only seven open dates — counting Thursday, which doesn't look much better in the weather forecasts — remain between now and the April 28 regular season finale at Presentation, meaning that the home date with the Saints may be a victim of this spring's weather.

"Our (Great Plains Athletic Conference) games are a priority," Fernandez said. We're going to try to keep our non-conference dates as well but, if it comes down to it, those teams know that our league games come first.

"The tough part is trying to prepare your team," Fernandez said. "You're inside all winter, and when you're inside, it's not a perfect situation.

The Mount Marty softball season got off to a rough start, with a tournament in Friends, Kan. — the outdoor opener for the Lancers last season — being called off because the host school got a foot of snow a week before the tournament. After the Lancers got back from a spring break trip to Arizona, the team had to wait another 2 1/2 weeks before it could finally get on the field for its home and conference opener.


