Hispanic And Women Farmers And Ranchers Claims Must Be Filed By May 1

WASHINGTON — Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack has announced the extension of the voluntary claims process for Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers who allege discrimination by the USDA in past decades. All claims must now be filed by May 1, 2013.

"Hispanic and women farmers who believe they have faced discriminatory practices in the past from the USDA have additional time to file a claim in order to have a chance to receive a cash payment or loan forgiveness," said Secretary Vilsack. "USDA urges potential claimants to contact the Claims Administrator for information and to file their claim packages on or before May

The process offers a voluntary alternative to litigation for each Hispanic or female farmer and rancher who can prove that USDA denied his or her application for loan or loan servicing as-

As announced in February 2011, the voluntary claims process will make available at least \$1.33 billion for cash awards and tax relief payments, plus up to \$160 million in farm debt relief, to eligible Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers. There are no filing fees to participate in the program.

Health Care Administration Added At MMC Responding to data from the United States Department of Labor

which indicates that Health Care Administration is a career that is expected to grow much faster than average in the next 10 years, Mount Marty College has added a health care administration emphasis to the business administration major.

Beginning with the fall 2013 semester, students will be able to specialize in this field. Students at the junior level or lower will be eligible to enroll for the program.

Mount Marty College Vice President and Dean of Academic Affairs Bob Tereshinski sensed it was an important component to add to the

current curriculum. "During our recent updating and restructuring of the business administration program we were looking at ways to make it more appealing to today's students," he said. "The data that we looked at strongly supported this type of emphasis. We felt it would make our business graduates better prepared to enter this field of work."

Over the course of the business administration program updating process three emphasis areas have been added: Finance/Banking, Management, and now Health Care Administration. The new emphasis will require 18 credits of coursework to obtain and will include classes such as Introduction to Health Care Administration, Health Care Finance, Legal Issues in Health Care, Human Resource Management, and six credit hours of internship. The courses will be offered in the classroom and online with the possibility of some of the courses being a combination of the two.

Tereshinski also adds that this is an exciting addition even for those that already have four year degrees.

This emphasis can also be beneficial as a stand-alone enhancement to non-degree seeking students," he said. "Professionals may already have a bachelor's degree and want to gain some knowledge in this field and by taking the eighteen credits they can do so."

The newly added health care administration emphasis will also result in new faculty being hired at Mount Marty. The search will look for two to three master degreed professionals.

"We have an extremely experienced professional pool that we can draw from right here in our region," added Tereshinski. "That is really where we'd like to pull our new adjunct faculty from. We will do our search over the summer and have those individuals in place for the fall
