the tax credits, the subsidies would help them purchase insurance in the new health insurance marketplace, also known as the "exchange," that is being set up in each state. The subsidies will go directly to those health plans, lowering the overall cost of the premiums.

"Individuals will not pay the full premium and then try to go to the IRS for reimbursement the following April 15," Pollack said. "Instead, the tax credit premium subsidy will be paid contemporaneously with the falling due of premiums. This means that people will not be (paying) out of

pocket or experience a cash flow problem.'

Pollack stressed that the size of the subsidies will be provided on a sliding scale, so people with lower incomes will receive the largest credits. For example, individuals with an income at 400 percent of poverty could be expected to contribute 9.5 percent of their income to their insurance premiums (with tax credits covering the rest of the expense), while individuals at 138 percent of poverty could be expected only to contribute 3.3 percent.

"Another way of saying that is, those people who need help the most

will receive it," he said. Pollack also noted that people who are eligible for the tax credits will not receive them automatically, but instead must apply for the subsidies during the enrollment process that begins in October. Because of this, he

said one of the reasons his organization released the study now was to inform the public about the possible benefits.

'The overwhelming majority of people who are uninsured today who will be eligible for these tax credit premium subsidies are unaware of it," he said.

With the amount of people the tax credits will be able to help, Pollack

called the subsidies a "game-changer." They will make health coverage affordable for huge numbers of uninsured families who would have been priced out of health coverage and care they need," he said. "It will also help those families that are purchasing coverage on their own, because it will make such coverage more affordable."

"Ninety percent of the American people support expanded background checks," he said.

The NRA told lawmakers it intended to keep track of how the votes were cast, and consider them in making decisions about its efforts in the midterm elections for Congress next year.

An opposing group, Mayors Against Illegal Guns, funded by New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg, said it would do likewise.

The NRA has a long track record in electoral politics, and is viewed by lawmakers in both political parties as unusually effective. Bloomberg's organization has yet to be tested.

In the AP-GfK poll, among independents, support for stricter gun laws dipped from 60 percent in January to 40 percent now. About three-fourths of Democrats supported them then and now, while backing among Republicans for looser laws about doubled to 19 percent.

The survey was conducted from April 11-15 by GfK Roper Public Affairs and Corporate Communications. It involved landline and cellphone interviews with 1,004 randomly chosen adults and had a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3.9 percentage points.
