Scotland Man To Appeal Murder Conviction

SCOTLAND (AP) — A South Dakota man sentenced to life in prison for causing the death of his infant son plans to appeal his conviction on second-degree murder and aggravated assault convictions.

The Daily Republic newspaper reports that the attorney for 39-year-old Chris Miller, of the town of Scotland, has notified the state Supreme Court of his intentions. Court documents containing arguments for the appeal likely will be due next month.

Å Turner County jury on Jan. 30 convicted Miller in the March 2011 death of 4-month-old Jacob Miller, who authorities said suffered a severe skull fracture and bleeding on the brain.

Renowned Chemist To Present Lecture At USD

VERMILLION - Omar M. Yaghi, Ph.D., professor of chemistry at the University of California-Berkeley and the director for the Molecular Foundry at the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, will deliver the 2013 Haines Lecture, "Porous Crystals for Clean Energy," at the University of South Dakota at 7 p.m. on Monday, April 22, at Churchill-Haines 118.

Yaghi, who has been on the faculties of Arizona State University, the University of Michigan and UCLA, has published more than 130 papers that have received more than 180 citations per paper. He is listed as among the top two most highly cited chemists worldwide. Yaghi's work encompasses the synthesis, structure and properties of inorganic compounds and the design and construction of new crystalline materials. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois-Urbana, and was a National Science Foundation Postdoctoral Fellow at Harvard University.

PIERRE — The Regional Watershed Advisory Task Force, created by the 2012 Legislature, will hold its first meeting of the 2013 Interim on Monday, April 22, at the Ramada Inn and Suites Conference Center in Mitchell, South Dakota. The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. (CT).

The task force was created to conduct studies and evaluations on drainage, watersheds, flood control, erosion, and related issues, as well as studies of alternative organizational structures and entities to address such issues. The task force will operate until January 2015.

At the April 22 meeting, the task force will hear presentations by Dr. Dennis Todey, state climatologist, South Dakota State University; Dr. Chris Hay, Agricultural and Biosystems Engineering, South Dakota State University; Clark Moeckly, Upper Crow Creek Watershed District; and Jeff Zimprich of the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

In addition, the task force will hear presentations by Brown, McCook, Kingsbury and Yankton counties on county experiences with drainage regulation and drainage issues




