able to talk again, if ever. The wound "doesn't mean he can't communicate, but right now I think he's in a condition where we can't get any information from him at all," Coats told ABC's "This Week."

It was not clear whether Tsarnaev was shot by police or inflicted the wound himself.

In the final standoff with police, shots were fired from the boat, but investigators have not determined where the gunfire was aimed, Davis said.

In an interview with The Associated Press, the parents of Tamerlan Tsarnaev insisted Sunday that he came to Dagestan and Chechnya last year to visit relatives and had nothing to do with the militants operating in the volatile part of Russia. His father said he slept much of the time.

The younger Tsarnaev could be charged any day. The most serious charge available to federal prosecutors would be the use of a weapon of mass destruction to kill people, which carries a possible death sentence. Massachusetts does not have the death penalty.

Across the rattled streets of Boston, churches opened their doors to remember the dead and ease the grief of the living.

At the Cathedral of the Holy Cross in South Boston, photographs of the three people killed in the attack and a Massachusetts Institute of Technology police officer slain Thursday were displayed on the altar, each face illuminated by a glowing white pillar candle.

"I hope we can all heal and move forward," said Kelly McKernan, who was crying as she left the service. "And obviously, the Mass today was a first step for us in that direction."

A six-block segment of Boylston Street, where the bombs were detonated, remained closed Sunday. But city officials were mapping out a plan to reopen it.

Mayor Thomas Menino said Sunday that once the scene is released by the FBI, the city will follow a five-step process, including environmental testing and a safety assessment of buildings. The exact timetable was uncertain.

Boston's historic Trinity Church could not host services Sunday because it was within the crime scene, but the congregation was invited to worship at the Temple Israel synagogue instead. The FBI allowed church officials a half-hour Saturday to go inside to gather the priests' robes, the wine and bread for Sunday's service.

Trinity's Rev. Samuel T. Lloyd III offered a prayer for

24 inches in diameter and roughly 250 feet long. It went from drawing in 3,600 gallons per minute to 800 gallons per minute within the course of a day. The sand was piled four feet above the pipe at one point. As fast as divers removed the material, the river current replaced it.

It was discovered that the 2011 flood had moved the Missouri River channel from the South Dakota side to the Nebraska side of the waterway. A large sandbar, part of which covered the intake pipe, formed near the Discovery Bridge.

A temporary water intake was installed in July, just as water usage in the city consistently jumped up to approximately 6 million gallons per day, a sustained peak that is rarely reached.

The permanent intake was raised approximately four feet and by August was operating at full capacity once again.

That wasn't the end of the city's struggles, however.

The flood also scoured approximately a foot of the river bottom out near Yankton, so when the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reduced its Gavins Point Dam releases for the winter months, it threatened to expose the water intake.

When you add structural constraints, invasive

species, governmental regulations along the Missouri National Recreational River and unreliable water quality to the list of items that threaten the surface water intake, it's easy to understand why HDR recommends that a new method of collecting water be found.

"It really opens your eyes," Goodmanson said. "All of those issues are why we're looking to go with a collector well."

**SOLUTIONS SOUGHT**

At its last meeting, the Yankton City Commission awarded a \$34,900 contract to Layne Christensen so it could investigate the possibility of building a horizontal collector well at Paddle Wheel Point.

"To build another (surface water) intake and get the capacity we need would probably cost \$5 million," Goodmanson said. "To me, for long-term planning, it makes more sense to spend \$9 million on the collector well. I know it's more money up front. But long term, I think you're better off. It's more reliable. It also adds to our redundancy, because we'll be able to get more water out of one collector well than we will out of one intake."

Goodmanson said the city hopes a collector well in Paddle Wheel Point will be able to produce as much as 8 MGD.

"If a collector well doesn't work, we're back to looking at more expensive options to get water," he

added.

That would include expanding the city's well field in Nebraska.

To get the needed capacity, Goodmanson said more land would probably have to be acquired for wells.

The wells would pose other challenges were they the single water source, he stated.

"Right now, we run 70 percent river water and 30 percent well water in our treatment plant," Goodmanson said.

While the well water doesn't have organic materials that can go on to cause problems meeting drinking water standards, it is high in ammonia, iron and manganese. That makes it more expensive to treat.

Furthermore, Goodmanson said he prefers having at least two water sources so the city has some redundancy should a problem arise with one of them.

"We are looking for the cheapest, most effective way to have the needed capacity, quality and reliability," he stated. "We're not looking for a short-term fix. We need a long-term solution."
