Sioux Falls hospital after the attack Saturday night. Authorities say inmate Carlos Green was subdued by other prison staff and locked up in a disciplinary section of the prison. The section of the prison where the incident happened was placed on lockdown

## **Train Derailment Blocks Panhandle Highway**

BRIDGEPORT, Neb. (AP) — BNSF railroad crews are still working to clean up a weekend coal train derailment in the Nebraska Panhandle. The loaded 124-car train derailed in Bridgeport early Sunday morning. The clean-up continued Monday morning.

BNSF spokesman Andy Williams says 15 of the cars derailed and

blocked the Highway 88 crossing on Main Street in Bridgeport.

Bridgeport Police Chief Scott Decoste says crews worked all day Sunday and into the night to clean up the mess, but he predicted the crossing would continue to be blocked most of Monday morning. BNSF says the track was damaged in the derailment and will have

to be repaired. Officials are still working to determine the cause of the derailment.

Stanley County Chief Deputy Sheriff Greg Swanson says an employee of the club found the man going through the safe about 8:30 a.m. Saturday. When officers arrived, a pursuit ensued with speeds reaching 90 mph. Cruse was located about three hours later.

# Man Charged In Johnson Threat

PIERR — A South Dakota man accused of threatening U.S. Sen. Tim Johnson because the senator allegedly supports gun control has been taken into custody.

Jonathan Constantine, of Piedmont, has been charged in federal court with transmitting in interstate commerce a threat to injure another. A conviction on that charge carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison.

Constantine allegedly posted a threatening message March 16 on the Democratic senator's Facebook page. An affidavit by an FBI special agent from Rapid City said Constantine wrote: "I'm giving you a last warning tim. Stop supporting gun control. It will be the last thing you ever do. If you want to end up dead somewhere just keep supporting it."

According to the affidavit filed in federal court, Constantine showed up at the sena-



tor's Rapid City office April 11 and screamed at the staff regarding Johnson's alleged support for gun control measures in Congress. He left when requested to do so, but the senator's staff then notified authorities about the alleged

The FBI agent's affidavit

said Constantine said he would not talk to agents without a lawyer present, but Constantine then added: "But I will say this about it, it was not a threat."

Constantine made his initial court appearance Monday by video conference with a federal judge based in Sioux Falls. An assistant U.S. attorney from Iowa handled the hearing for the prosecution because U.S. Attorney for South Dakota Brendan Johnson is the senator's son. A bail hearing for Constantine is scheduled for Thursday.

Neil Fulton, federal public defender for South Dakota and North Dakota, said his of-

fice was still studying the allegations.
"As with anyone, when you're indicted you're simply charged. It's an allegation. It's not proof of anything," Fulton told The Associ-

ated Press. "In the environment we live in, certainly particularly threats about public officials have a tendency to whip up public frenzy. It's important to step back and let the process work," Fulton said.

The Argus Leader reported that in Monday's hearing, Constantine told U.S. Magistrate Judge John Simko that he suffers from posttraumatic distress disorder.

When the judge asked Constantine if he had taken any medication or had ever been diagnosed with a mental illness, Constantine said he has post-traumatic stress disorder and a traumatic brain injury. He also said he had not taken his pain medication since his arrest over the weekend.

# School Bill Divides Lawmakers

LINCOLN, Neb. — Lawmakers remained divided Monday over a proposal to change Nebraska's school-funding formula, which determines how much money rural and urban districts receive from the state.

The bill divided lawmakers who represent smaller, rural schools with shrinking enrollments, and state senators from fast-growing districts in Omaha, Lincoln and Grand Island. Faced with an impasse on Monday, lawmakers moved on to other bills without voting.

Sen. Kate Sullivan, chairwoman of the Education Committee, said the bill was an attempt to compromise on the funding formula. State-aid for schools is often controversial because some schools end up feeling short-changed.

Mike Gloor of Grand Island said schools in his district are facing more financial pressure because of an increase in students, including many from low-income families and those with limited English language skills. Gloor said his schools have delayed maintenance projects, which saved \$500,000, and shifted \$1 million out of a district building fund to cover basic education costs. They also cut into earlychildhood education programs.

# **South Dakotans Deal With More Than Spring Snow**

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — As South Dakotans spend another spring day digging out from up to a foot of snow, a mental health professional is recommending people take vitamins, remain active and escape through books to stave off depression.

Forecasters say up to a foot of snow could fall in the Black Hills on Monday. Many schools in the western part of the state started late or called off classes. Up to half a foot could fall in the eastern half of the state.

Kelly Marker, a licensed counselor with Behavior Management Systems in Rapid City, said people who struggle with depression and anxiety will be the most affected by this year's seemingly neverending winter and a lack of sun-

light.
"They certainly can have a more difficult time just because we're accustomed to seeing the sunshine come out at this point. It can have an impact on individuals like that," she said, adding that people who are not susceptible to depression will probably just end up being a little crabbier. "We wake up to the snow and say, 'Oh, man."

Marker said she recommends clients taken Vitamin D-3 pills and go tanning. On snow days, Marker said she tries to remain active by cleaning or working on a project she put off. She'll also escape the weather outside by curling up with a good book.




